Of fever, on Thursday last, at the Monastery in this City, Mr.
Michael Dominick O'Brien. The zeal and genuine piety of this truly
religious man endeared him to his brethren of the Christian School
Society, and his death is sincerely deplored by the poor children to
whose education he had devoted himself in early life.

On the 24th instant, of erysipelas, after a few days illness, at his
seat, Castle-Mitchell, county Kildare, Robert Chapman, Esq. aged
45 years. His funeral was attended by his sorrowing friends and
the surrounding farmers and peasantry. After the funeral service
had been concluded the officiating Clergyman, the Rev. Frederick
Stewart French, delivered a most eloquent and feeling address to
the persons assembled round the grave, appropriate to the awful
event, during which the Rev. Gentleman as well as all those about
him appeared deeply affected. He said he had attended the death-
bed of the deceased during the brief period of his illness; and though
he, as well as his departed friend, would have wished that a longer
space had been allowed him, yet he could say that he died relying
solely on the merits of his crucified Redeemer, and trusted the sad
lesson thus given, in this awful period so fraught with gloom, would
be turned to profit by those whom he addressed. The loss of this
justly lamented Gentleman in the neighbourhood where he resided,
and at this crisis as a Magistrate, a landlord, and an employer, is
deeply felt. His afflicted friends feel that the chasm caused by his
death can never be filled up. The veil must be thrown over the
poignant and indescribable anguish of his beloved consort, left with
a numerous family yet too young to feel their loss.
