Exchequer was properly unwilling to give any previous or  
positive explanation of his intentions (as I informed you a  
few posts ago) until he could publicly state what he meant  
to do with the surplus revenue of the year. This surplus  
amounts to £662,000, of which he applies £250,000 to the  
reduction, to one-half of the duty on all kinds of paper,  
consolidating the tax upon every description of the article, as  
he found it, he said, impossible to classify it. Further, as  
regards your particular branch, "stained paper," he extin-  
guishes the tax on it altogether; to take effect from 25th  
October next, so as to afford time for the disposal of the  
stock on hands. Meantime, in order to prevent the cessation  
to employment between this and October, when the low duty  
comes into operation, he allows any paper manufactured in  
the interval to be bonded and taken out, after the 25th Octo-  
ber, at the reduced duty. Now as you would have to wade  
through an immense mass of explanation and figures (for he  
was two hours and a-half speaking), I thought it might be  
agreeable to you to furnish you with this abstract, relating  
to your particular business; it is, however, to be remarked,  
that his intentions have not yet obtained the formal sanction  
of the House of Commons, yet there is little to apprehend
