Sunday evening last, about seven o clock, the peaceasse inhabitants of Kilfinane, were alarmed by an irruption from that nursery of turbulence "Glinroe," when a crowd of fellows, after regaling themselves in a public house rushed forward, armed with stones and other weapons. Shortly after this savage rabble commenced an attack on a few individuals, stones were seen to fly from all quarters, and nothing less than the loss of several lives was apprehended. Chief Constable O'Connell and Serjeant Southern, with three Sub-Constables, were immediately in attendance, aided by Charles Bennett, Esq. Coroner, all of whom, at the risk of their lives, rushed amid the shower of stones coming from both parties, and ultimately succeeded in seizing four of this sanguinary rabble. Mr. Bennett was knocked down by a

blow of a stone, as also one of the Sub-Constables, named

Mason, the former from the effect of the blow received a

slight fracture on the head, and was bruised in several parts

of the body from blows. In a short time after the town was

restored to its original state of tranquillity.

Sunday evening last, a young man of the name of Nunan, was waylaid on his way home from Newcastle, within a quarter of a mile of that town, by three fellows, who beat him in a most brutal manner, gave him several cuts on the head, and a desperate fracture of the scull; he is in imminent danger of his life. Those fellows, a few hours previous, were shouting through town for four-years old. They had not been more than 50 yards gone, when a friend of Nunan's came up and recognised him, and while endeavouring to raise him up, these inhuman savages hurried back and assailed him with stones, but fortunately he escaped and made the best of his way to Nunan's house, about a mile distant, where he procured assistance and returned in quest of the dead man, as he thought, but there was no trace of Nunan, with the exception of his hat cut to pieces, and pleuty of blood. A report was immediately made to the Police, who spent the whole night in a vain search for him. However they succeeded in arresting three young men, sons of comfortable farmers, charged with the offence. About 8 o'clock on Monday morning Nunan was found in a stable of Mr. James Furlong, lying under the horses feet, after eight hours of insensibility. Nunan asserts that after his friend left him, the party laid on him a second time until they considered life extinct, and then dragged him to this stable and threw him under the horses feet, so as to appear that he had been going home drunk, made his way into the
