To-day Colonel Shaw Kennedy, Inspector-General of the
Irish Constabulary, inspects, at Rathbane, near this City,
the County and City Police force, including Chief Consta-
bles, Constables, and Sub-Constables. Time has stamped
his record upon the features of several men in this establish-
ment, who, after years of hard service, will be dispensed
with in the new organisation, but receiving, of course, a
pension or gratuity adequate to their merits.

Colonel Shaw Kennedy inspected the police force of
Galway on Monday last, and of Clare yesterday.

The Lord Lieutenant has granted a respite until further

assizes for the violation of Mary Sullivan at Abbeyfeale.

Aldermen Mahony and Watson held an inquest on Thurs-
day at the City Hospital, on the body of George Wheleer, of
Sexton-street, whose death was reported in our last. This
fine little boy was playing with other companions in William-
street, about four o'clock on Tuesday afternoon, and making
a race from one of his playmates, when he incautiously
struck against the shaft of a loaded car which was in motion,
and immediately fell, the wheel of the vehicle passing over
his body before the driver could pull up, or was well aware
of the danger. He lingered in great torture until next morn-
ing, when death relieved him from pain. The verdict of the
jury, after hearing witnesses of the casualty, and the evidence
of Dr. Franklin, who promptly attended the boy, and proved
the fatal injury to the intestines, was 'accidental death,'
thus absolving the carman, who was in custody, of any blame.

Michael Grimes of Clondrina, in the north liberties, was
crushed by a horse and car against a stone wall in that
neighbourhood last Tuesday, and so badly hurt that he died
next day. On post mortem examination it appeared the
vertebrae of the back were fractured, and part of the in-
testines wounded. At the inquest held by Aldermen
Mahony and Watson, the jury returned a verdict of
accidental death.

James Tracy, a labourer, who received a severe injury of
the knee and thigh bone, by the fall of a stone arch at the
taking down of the old Mayoralty house in Bridge-street,
last month, died this week after much suffering in hospital.
The poor man's knee joint was dislocated and the thigh bone
forced through the flesh and skin, but he would not allow
amputation, which was the only chance for his life, and he
died a victim to his obstinacy. An inquest was held by
Aldermen Mahony and Watson, and a verdict returned
accordingly.

An innocent little boy, not more than five years old, was
early last evening enticed into a bye passage near George's-
Quay, by a woman who promised him an apple, but the
unprincipled wretch immediately stripped her little victim of
his hat, spencer, and frock, and fled, leaving the child half
naked, and crying with fright.

It is ascertained that the Golden Mills were robbed of the
beam, scales and weights, which Serjeant Riedy, of the
