The Society already amongst its Members, besides those in and about the Counties of Clare, Kerry, Cork, &c. a sufficient evidence that as the objects become known, the protection it affords is readily sought for, and a powerful motive to the District to persevere in their efforts. They call upon all who are in similar circumstances may render it expedient for them to do so without delay.
