

Lord Lichfield nets several thousands by the St. Leger; and what is rather unusual, the winner, *Elis*, was the first favourite in the betting list for a week before the race.

Mademoiselle D'Este, whose approaching marriage to Prince Ernest of Philippthal is announced, is on a visit to the Earl and Countess Brownlow, at Belton House, Lincolnshire, and is not expected to return to her residence in visit to the King at Windsor for the purpose of finally arranging the marriage, which will shortly be solemnized at Windsor. His Serene Highness is in his forty-seventh year, and is the youngest brother of the Landgrave of Hesse the Emperor of Russia. His Highness's mother was a Princess of Saxe-Meinigen, and he is first cousin to her Majesty.

Prince Metternich's celebrated wines, made on his estates at Johannisbergh, are worth £600 the hoghead. The first quality is hardly ever sold. It is like the Steinberger, the picking only of one or two of the finest grapes on the bunch. The Irish steamers are daily leaving the Broomielaw, Glasgow, crowded with Irish reapers returning home. Many of these poor creatures, owing to the disappointment consequent on the backward state of the harvest, are forced to beg until they get as much money as enables them to return to the place of their nativity.

The Recorder opened the Criminal Court yesterday, where under the new act all prisoners are entitled to a copy of the depositions made against them. This day, George E. Peacocke, a Solicitor, son to the Rev. J. A. Peacocke, was found guilty of forging the names of Messrs. Watkins and Fountwell, £7,814 Stock, belonging to Selina Wilmer. The Jury recommended him to mercy.

The life of Sir Walter Scott, by Mr. Lockhart, his son-in-law, will be published in the course of this winter. Cheltenham is at this period exceedingly full of company. The last Master of the Ceremonies ball was attended by 800 of the elite of fashion.

Ole Bull, the great violinist, Bocha, Curioni, and Miss Bruce, have just returned to town from a successful tour through the western provinces, where their average receipts per week amounted to £400.

Malibran got £600 for singing at the Manchester Musical Festival, but in consequence of her exertion she still remains severely indisposed, and an Italian physician is in attendance. Mr. Hill, an American actor of high reputation, is in London, and will appear at one of the two large houses, in a drama written to display the peculiarities of Jonathan.

Eighteen members of the Bristol Corporation, consisting of an equal number of Conservatives and Liberals, were unanimously nominated, at a meeting of the Town Council on Tuesday, as charity trustees for Bristol.

Mrs. Graham is sufficiently recovered from her late accident to be enabled to leave Dodinghurst with safety. Mr. and Mrs. Maeder (the late celebrated Clara Fisher) have arrived at Liverpool, by the packet ship *Virginia*, from New York, whence they sailed the 24th ult. They have set out for London, where they are engaged.

On Monday, one of the most dreadful fires which ever occurred in the neighbourhood of Monmouth, took place at Stone, the princely mansion of the late Sir Robert Mansel, suffering a small fire, which they had kindled for the purpose of melting lead, to continue burning while they were at dinner. The fire spread with fearful rapidity, so that the whole of the north-eastern part of the mansion is in flames before it was discovered! The scene of destruction is truly indescribable; all we can say is, that of ruins remains of this once splendid mansion but a blackened

Marlybone, yesterday, William Taylor, a watchman, employed in guarding the new church now erecting in Regent-street, Regent's Park, was placed at the bar charged with having deliberately shot, with a musket, Cap. Windham Edward of the Royal Horse Guards, stationed in the park, on Saturday night. The prisoner was fully committed to Newgate, to take his trial for the offence.

Engaged a boat at London-bridge-stairs, on the Surrey side, and requested to be rowed across the river; when near the pier he was observed to empty his trousers and pockets of their contents, which he placed in his boat; shortly after the waterman saw him take off his coat, and place it on the seat. The Dublin Police-officers identified the prisoner against whom he had a warrant, and Mr. O'Connell, the prisoner to be given up to him. The prisoner was heavily ironed, and put on board a Dublin steamer.

His Majesty's frigate, the *Madagascar*, 42 guns, arrived in Kingstown Harbour, on the 19th inst. Several hours in the morning off the light ship. The Lord Lieutenant rode through town accompanied by two of his Aides-de-Camp.

The new buildings on the North side of the city commenced next month.
The Marquess of Leinster and the Marquess of Salisbury, is gone to the Continent, bringing home his sister, the Princess of Wales, by the Royal family of the Atlantic.

Potatoes were imported from Van Diemen's and New England, price £10 to £12 a ton; mutton and fish good and abundant, fowl dear. The moral condition of the colonial population remained in a deplorable state, a career of vice, outrage and plunder, the distinguishing characteristics of a community corrupted by the very refuse of the mother country.

Letters from the 60th Rifles, first Battalion, at Corfu, received at the LIMERICK CHRONICLE Office yesterday to the Hon. G. A. Spencer, was in command of the Battalion. Colonel Cross, commanding, received at the CHRONICLE Office yesterday, also left that Regiment in good health on the 13th instant.

Letters from Barbadoes to the 9th of August, this day came to hand at the LIMERICK CHRONICLE OFFICE. Major-General Sir Lionel Smith, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Windward Islands, and Commander to the Legislature of Barbadoes last month his promotion to the Government of Jamaica. A committee was appointed to present an address to Sir Lionel Smith on his departure, which is matter of very general regret to the Barbadians. The Marquess of Sligo may be expected from Barbadoes next month. "In the Bay His Majesty Ship *Gannett*, Capt. Maxwell, and His Majesty's Brig *Snake*, Capt. Warren, with the Meteor Steam-vessel, and Alert Packet, Capt. Warren, with Capt. Stroug, expected hourly from Grenada, with the Belvidera, quarters of the 76th, to form part of the Garrison here. The Moira transport, with the whole of the 19th, sailed on the 27th ult. for Cork. The 86th are also under orders of readiness for home, but as the hurricane season is so near at hand, they fear they will be disappointed and have to wait till Christmas. There are about 100 invalids and men recommended to be sent to their depots for change of climate, together with many widows and orphans, collected here for the annual transport that used formerly to be sent out, to relieve the command of so many in-effective drawing provisions from the King's stores, but through the working of the pitiful system of economy for the last two seasons, the orders have been sent respecting them. Many invalids died in hospital here since their arrival from the out-stations, whose lives might have been saved by a timely removal to a better climate. Sir Lionel Smith and family are expected to embark for Jamaica this month in the *Belvidera*."

Colonel Sir T. Dowman, K.C.H. commanding the Royal Artillery in Ireland, arrived from Dublin, on Wednesday night, and next day inspected the Brigade of Royal Horse Artillery in this garrison, under Captain Saunders, which force he found in a highly efficient state of service. He was accompanied in his inspection by Lieut.-Colonel F. Smith, R.A. of this district. The gallant Officer left this yesterday for Cork.

The Royal Horse Artillery buried two men since their late arrival in this garrison. Captain Russell, 84th Regiment, has not left the Service Companies at Jamaica for England, though the United Service Gazette stated he did. This Officer is only gone on a short cruise from his quarters.

Lieut. White, 84th Depot, has replaced Lieut. Hanley, 84th, in the detachment at Rathkeale. The draft of the 84th Depot marches from the Castle Barracks for Cork on Monday morning, under an escort, commanded by Ensign Davison, to embark for Jamaica. James Hannie and John Anderson, privates of the Royal Regiment, are sentenced by Court-Martial to 14 days hard labour and confinement, for violating the articles of war.

A trotting match for £15 each, took place yesterday near town, on the Dublin road, between Captain Brooke, of the Royals, and Lieut. Egan, 84th Depot, riding their own mares, 13 stone each. It was a very pretty display of horsemanship, which numbers went out to witness, and Captain Brooke won, but not with much to spare. The distance was two miles and a half.

The depot companies of the 34th Regiment at Pigeon House Fort, Dublin, under command of Captain Conolly, have received the route for Newbridge, to which station they marched yesterday.

The 33d Regiment in Dublin garrison have told off the service and depot companies, preparatory to embarking at Cork for Gibraltar. The depot marches on Monday morning for Birr.

The 12th and 93d Regiments leave Dublin on the first of next month, the former for Enniskillen, the latter for Newry, to be replaced in the metropolis by the 46th and 77th Regiments.

The first division of the 82d Regiment from Kilkenny marched into Cork this day. A draft consisting of Ensign Prothero, a Serjeant, and 30 rank and file, of the 14th Depot, with an escort of 30 men, under Capt. Douglas, have marched from Wexford for Cork, where they embark in a few days to join the Service Companies in the West Indies.

The draft from the depot of the 8th Regiment at Castlebar joined their service companies. The 35th Regiment at Cork has received the order of readiness for foreign service "immediately." Lieut. Goldie Harding has joined at Cork from Doneraile. Lieut. Wright and Ensign Pigott, 89th Regiment, are ordered from the depot at Omagh to Cork, where they embark with a draft for the service companies in the West Indies. The Depot of the 70th Regiment, at Portsmouth, goes to Jersey, and the Depot of the 5th Fusiliers, at Dover, moves to Portsmouth.

The Depot 2d Rifle Brigade at Guernsey will replace the 5th Depot at Portsmouth. The second Battalion Royals which sailed from Cork for Quebec in the *Maitland*, on the 6th of July last, had not arrived out on the 19th of last month, to which date letters and papers have been received at our Office. All the troops in Dublin exercised in the Phoenix Park, on Tuesday. The Lieutenant-General Commanding, Sir E. Blakeney, and two Aides-de-camp, Lieut.-Colonel Warren, Lieut.-Colonel Smith, Lieut.-Colonel Badcock, and other officers were on the ground.

Lieutenant-Colonel Considine, K. H. half-pay Unattached (late of the British Auxiliary Legion,) is appointed Military Secretary, and Lieutenant Bates, of the 82d Regiment, Aide-de-Camp to Lieutenant-General Sir S. Whittingham, KCB. David Walker, Esq. Deputy Judge Advocate General, has returned to Dublin from England, where he had been on leave of absence.

Colonel Warren, Quarter-Master-General, has arrived in Cork from Dublin. The officers of the 92d depot, who have distinguished themselves in amateur theatricals at Derry, are Captain Atherley, Lieutenant Campbell, and Ensign Miller. Major and Mrs. Baynes, 8th, or King's Regt. entertained a large party of their fashionable friends to a ball and supper in the barracks of Castlebar, on Friday evening.

Lieut.-Colonel the Hon. Henry S. Fane, 34th Regiment, Falmouth from Halifax, Nova Scotia, has arrived at health from foreign service. The Hon. Captain Hay, Sub-Inspector of Police at Wexford, apprehended a deserter from the 14th depot, near that town on Monday, having broken away from the guard escorting him.

Frederick Hughes, Esq. son of Robert Hughes, Esq. of Wexford, has been promoted in the 7th Madras Cavalry. J. Dyson, Esq. is appointed Captain in the West York Militia.

The ships now lie with Robert also at water Roberts also harbour for some time—Several of the Officers arrived in this city last night from on board, and have departed this morning—some for Dublin and others for Killarney.—*Cork Herald.*

There are 650 hands on board of each of the three ships of the line at Cove, including 150 marines. Lord Dunsany visited the fleet yesterday, and was received with the honours due to his rank. A splendid ball will be given at Cove in compliment to Sir Charles Paget and his officers. The Lord Bishop of Limerick and family leave Cove on Tuesday for the See house in this City.

Lieutenant Thomas Franklin, Revenue Police, has been removed to Milford, Donegal, from Ardara. Mr. Reginald Greene, C.C. has been ordered from Ballyragget to Johnstown, Mr. Dames, C.C. having left the latter place on leave of absence for some weeks.

Lieut. Kelly of the Revenue Police, who was for several years stationed at Bunrana, has been promoted to the rank of Sub-Inspector, and removed to Gortin, county Tyrone. Connaught Constabulary, under Major Priestly, Provincial Inspector, to whom Mr. Lovelock, Barrack-master of Castlebar, yesterday delivered up the Military barracks in Ballinrobe, for the use of the Police.

Captain Nangle, Police Magistrate, at Cashel, has apprehended all but one of the murderers of David Tobin. The Hon. George Ponsonby has arrived at Boomhall, on Clements. Lord Dunsany and family, including the Hon. Randal Plunkett, M.P. are staying, with a large party of fashionable, at the mansion of the Earl of Bandon. Queen Adelaide has given more orders for Irish Poplin, of the brocade texture, which is a splendid fabric prepared in Dublin.

The Marquess of Clanricarde is one of the Stewards for Loughrea races, which commence on Tuesday. The tenantry of Lord Dillon, in the barony of Costello, Mayo, have resolved upon addressing his Lordship on his arrival in that county, and giving him a public dinner on Monday. This Nobleman is a humane landlord. Lord de Vesce has subscribed £50 to the fund for erecting a Scriptural School house at Monkstown, Cork.

Sir William J. Brabazon, M.P. has arrived at his seat near Swinford, Mayo, with the title of Deputy Lieutenant of that county. The Right Rev. Dr. Ryan held no ordination yesterday at St. John's Chapel, one of the candidates being sick in fever. The Right Rev. Dr. Ryan has appointed the Rev. Mr. O'Brien, Coadjutor of Effin parish, in place of the Rev. Mr. Shanahan.

For the Counties of Limerick and Clare 114 persons have taken game licenses this season. From the many sportsmen now abroad throughout the wide expanse of these counties, we are persuaded it should be more than double the above number, and we therefore warn our friends that the above Office has sent out videttes to take observation, for there is a double penalty by the Act of last Session—*Verbum sap.* One hundred and sixty notices of registry have been served for this County, preparatory to October Quarter Sessions the 13th prox.

For Killarney Sessions next month, 74 notices of registry have been served for Kerry. Eight persons have served notice to register the elective franchise for the county Clare, at Kiltrush, October Sessions. Only one elector registered for the borough of Mallow at the Sessions in Cork this week, 28 for Youghal, 17 for Kinsale, and 45 for the County Cork. Mr. Martley, the presiding Barrister, ruled the lodger point in favor of the applicants for registry, when they had set the greater part of their premises, and not retained to the value of £10 in their own possession.

Lord Ennismore attended a meeting at Fermoy to-day, to promote a liberal registry in the county Cork, and meet a deputation from Dublin for that purpose. Lord Glengall presided to-day at a meeting in Caher, to promote the Suir and Shannon Junction Railroad. Henry Villiers Stuart, Esq. Lieutenant of Waterford, was entertained to a public dinner at the Town-hall on Thursday evening. Mr. Stuart was accompanied by the Hon. Mr. Petre and the Hon. Mr. Phipps, Lord Mulgrave's brother.

Mr. Richard Keane, Bart. presided. Grace was said by the Rev. Dr. Foran, a Roman Catholic Priest. Mr. Stuart pronounced a violent philippic against Lord Lyndhurst. Mr. Phipps returned thanks for his brother's health, and Mr. O'Gorman, Chairman of Kilkenny, spoke to the toast of Justice for Ireland. Some of the company remained up until day-light.

The Hon. Captain Phipps is a Candidate for Dungarvan, and is canvassing for that borough. This makes it pretty nearly certain that Mr. O'Loghlen will go to the vacant seat on the Bench—for it may be presumed that Lord Mulgrave is pretty well acquainted with the existing arrangement. As will be no mystery further observed about Mr. O'Loghlen's official destiny.

Mr. Vignoles, Engineer of the Cork and Passage Railway, is arrived in Cork. John Warren, of Kanturk, Esq. has announced himself a candidate for the vacant Coronership of the County Cork. All the County electors are now entitled to vote for such an officer, and where six candidates are in the field, a vigorous contest may be expected. Mr. Gilkrest, Kanturk, is one of the candidates. The Secretaryship to the Grand Jury of Mayo, hitherto held by Messrs. Lambert and Clendenning, is now solely vested in the latter, his colleague having been elected Treasurer of the County. The other candidates dispute the legal eligibility of Mr. A. Clendenning to fill the new office.

Blackrock Church, Cork, which has, for some time past, been under repairs, occasioned by the awful effects of lightning last winter, will, on Sunday next, be re-opened for the celebration of Divine Service. The spire has been restored to its original height. Thirty-nine men and women were taken before the magistrates at the Police-office, Cork, within the last five days for drunkenness, and fined (under the 6th and 7th of William IV. chap. 38, sec. 12), five shillings each, or in default of payment incarcerated forty-eight hours. Thirteen of the number liquidated the debt and were set at liberty; while the others, having spent their last shilling in the dram-shop, were marched off to durance vile.

By the new game act, if a game dealer purchases game of any one who has not a legal right to sell it, both the buyer and seller are liable to penalties; the seller to any sum not exceeding £2 and costs for every head of game sold or offered for sale; and the dealer any sum not exceeding £10 and costs. By the late act either buyer or seller may inform and be witness against the other; gets half the penalty, and is freed from being informed on himself.

Under the new Grand Jury Act, 6 and 7 William 4th, ch. 116, sec. 96—Diocesan Schools must be supported only to the step hill of Grange, which has been a subject of general and frequent complaint. The following important notice appears in the Dublin Gazette:—"It is intended to apply to Parliament at the ensuing Sessions, for an Act to repeal all the Turnpike Acts now in existence for the county of Dublin, and to bring in a Bill to place under controul of the Board of Public Works, leading to chief Towns of Counties."
