Saturday night last, about 11 o'clock, an alarm of fire at Courtbrack ran through the city, and it was ascertained that part of the out-offices of Mr. John Lucas, in the south liberties, were in a blaze, but fortunately with the prompt aid of his domestics, and the co-operation of some of his neighbours who hurried to the scene, the flames were quickly got under, by tearing down the roof of the out-office, and thus cutting off communication with the dwelling-house, in the vicinity of which stood several stacks of hay and corn. The spark of a pipe falling on some loose straw is supposed to have originated the fire; as it happened, the escape was most providential. The Mayor, and the Artillery engine, with a party of fatigue men, were promptly on the spot, but happily their exertions were not required.

Wednesday night, a fire broke out at the stores of Mr. Wm. Hill, in William-street, which however was suppressed before any serious damage occurred.

Friday night an accidental fire in the residence of Mr. Hogan, near Pallis Castle, destroyed his furniture.

Edward Kelly, rather an elderly man, who was thrown from a restive horse in William-street, on Saturday last, and severely hurt, as then announced by us, died in hospital of the injuries he received last Sunday. The Mayor held an inquest on his body, verdict accordingly, but with a censure from the jury upon the dangerous practice of exercising horses in the streets.

The charges investigated at the important inquiry in Listowel, affecting the character of three Magistrates of Kerry, and a Chief Constable of Police, are recorded in our columns. These charges would implicate the accused in a degree of criminal irregularity, which it is painful to contemplate. Amongst the witnesses examined were Police Sergeant Chillingworth, Timothy Brennan, Edmond M'Elligott, William Thompson, Policeman, Mr. John Clements, Engineer, whose evidence was material, for he testified to the bad feeling between the Magistrates and Chief Constable at Petty Sessions, having described the conduct of the Police Officer to the Bench as " savage and brutal," and that Mr. M. Donogh also applied the word "false" to the Magistrates. Mr. Cashel and Mr. James Raymond, Magistrates, corroborated the evidence of Mr. Clements. John F. Hewson, Esq. Deputy Lieutenant, Pat. Nichol, Policeman, Michael Quigley, Mr. Richard Harnett, Solicitor, Edmond Cain, and James M'Carthy, were the other witnesses examined on the first day's proceedings.
