the City and Liberties the number of notices served on the Clerk of the Peace was 239, and the list, according to public notice, was also called over three times, but the sum total of registry amounted to 23 persons only, viz.: radicals 8, including 2 re-registries; conservatives 15, no re-registries; conservative majority nine. The radical agent pretended to account for their paltry muster, by alluding to the late gunpowder explosion, which prevented several attending; and then he alleged his supporters had mistaken the day of attendance. Both pleas, however, were considered untenable by the Court, public notice of the day for registering having been early announced in the newspapers, and those persons at either side who neglected attending to qualify, could only blame themselves for the disappointment. Mr. B. has for some months not carried with him any money to a large amount. Two farmers returning from Clonmel, after selling corn, were met by an armed party same night, and robbed, and shamefully beaten—the name of one was Dwyer, of Bunlong, near Bansha, who lost £12.

John Barry, of Ahane, in the Liberties, farmer, who had been missing for some days before Christmas, was found drowned in the river near Coonagh bank yesterday morning. The Mayor held an inquest on his body. Verdict—found drowned, but under what circumstances he had fallen into the water did not appear.

The annual return from the County Gaol for the year 1836, exhibits the following statement of crime, ages of offenders, and state of Instruction:—Total criminals committed were 728 males, 75 females, of which 4 were sentenced to death, but afterwards commuted; 8 transported for life, and 19 for 7 years; 10, two years imprisonment and over one; 45, one year and above six months; and 493 to six months and under; 18 not guilty, on trial; and 210 not prosecuted.—Ages of males:—4, twelve years and under; 25, sixteen to twenty; 150, twenty-one to thirty; 383, thirty to forty; 106, forty to fifty; 37, fifty to sixty; 18, sixty to seventy; 5, above sixty: of females 1, sixteen and above twelve; and respectively as the males onwards, the numbers are 8, 39, 16, 7, 3, and one above sixty. State of instruction when committed; of males, 161 could read and write; 114 could read only; and 453 could neither read or write; of females, 2 could read only; and 73 could neither read or write.

The High Sheriff has received his Excellency's order to discharge William Ryan from the County Gaol, who has passed nearly two years in prison for a conviction of manslaughter.
