New arrangement of the Sessions' divisions in the county Clare. After the present sessions the division of Kilrush is to constitute two districts, one to be called the district of Kilrush, consisting of the baronies of Moyarta, Clonderlaw and all the barony of Ibrickane, except the parish of Kilfarboy four sessions in the year to be held for that district in Kilrush; the other district is to consist of the baronies of Corcomroe and Burren, and the parish of Kilfarboy, barony of Ibrickane, with sessions four times in the year, in Ennistimond. The present division of Ennis is to constitute two districts, one the baronies of Bunratty, Islands and Inchiquin, with two sessions in the year in Six-mile-bridge, and two in Ennis; the barony of Tulla to constitute the other district, with Sessions twice a-year in Killaloe, and twice a-year in Tulla.

A young woman of the name of Catherine Kelly, while stooping for a can of water at Bank-place slip, fell in and was carried down by the stream under the New-Bridge. A boat was instantly launched by two sailors who rescued the drowning person below the Custom-House, but on being conveyed to hospital, it was found the vital spark had fled.
