They first laid hold on Mullane's eldest daughter, who struggled with them for a considerable time, aided by her father, sisters, and brother-in-law, but to no purpose, as they were overpowered by a superior force. The poor old man was knocked down, the sisters and brother-in-law beaten, and the young woman was mounted on a horse, ready for the purpose, behind a young man of the name of Flanagan, who immediately galloped away with his prize. She has not since been heard of. On information being received of the outrage at Newcastle, Chief Constable Armstrong with a few police, on Monday night, proceeded to a mountainous district of the country, and after a most harrassing search, succeeded in arresting three of the gang, who were safely lodged in the Bridewell of Newcastle.

An infirm man, of the name of Peter Howard, died in George-street on Thursday, having been seized with a fit of coughing and spitting of blood, from which is supposed he had burst a blood-vessel, as a few minutes closed his earthly career.

Kelly, of Mountbellew, returning from Athlone on Tuesday evening, (while riding at a pretty quick pace,) his horse unfortunately stumbled, by which the rider was precipitated over the animal's head; under the effects of his fall Mr. Kelly lingered until Friday morning, when death put a period to his sufferings.
