DEATHS.

On Tuesday night, at his house in Hume-street, Dublin, at an early age, of fever, sincerely and deservedly lamented, Surgeon William A. Gibson, only son of Alderman Gibson, of this city, late our Chief Magistrate. In recording the decease of this estimable young gentleman, we are only expressing the general regret for an event that brings so much mourning into his family, and comes with such suddenness upon his friends. Already an ornament to his profession, and just opening into lucrative and extensive practice, he devoted some hours every day to a gratuitous attendance upon the poor in his district; and the disease which has terminated so fatally was imbibed in discharging his self-appointed duty of "healing the sick," and performing those offices of humanity which, in the surgical and medical as well as clerical profession, so often dignify a Christian's death. Mr Gibson was naturally desirous of arriving at the eminence which, in every pursuit, invites us to industry and labour, and with this object had latterly made Dublin his permanent residence, but in his occasional visits to his parents here, he renewed the friendships formed in his earlier intercourse with his fellow-citizens, and rendered them more enduring by the amiable social qualities he disclosed in riper years. Of mild and courteous manners, an ingenuous disposition, and unbending integrity, he possessed what he merited, the esteem of all who knew him, and the warmest affection of his friends. It is not eighteen months since we announced the union of this gentleman with a most interesting and accomplished lady in Dublin, who, by his premature death, is left disconsolate; yet she and his parents have, in their sad bereavement, cause of thankfulness, as he died rejoicing in the Lord, the only solid hope that can sustain us in the hour of death. Mr. Gibson's remains were deposited in the family vault of St. Anne's church yesterday.
