He was got by Waxy Pope, (bred by the Duke of Grafton, and winner of the great Derby stakes at Epsom, &c. &c. and whose blood is so much approved of in England.)—DISTINGUE'S Dam was the speedy Mare Flight by Escape (the best Horse ever bred in Ireland,) grand dam Young Heroine by Old Bagot, (Sire of the celebrated Horses Swindler and Master Bagot, &c. &c. great grand dam Old Heroine (Tom Turf's dam by Hero) son of Cade, on a daughter of Lord Portmore's Spinner by Almanzor, on a full Sister to Bay Bolton, by Hautboy, &c. &c.—Hero was bred in Yorkshire, by Sir Richard Hilton, in 1753, and proved himself to be a most superior Horse, having won twenty-three races in England and Ireland, at all weights and distances, beating the best Horses of his time in both Countries.

DISTINGUE'S great great Grand Dam, was got by Snap on the only sister to Old Regulus by the Godolphin Arabian, &c. &c.; thus combining Eclipse with the stout running blood of Herod, Highflyer, Cade, (Sire of Matchim, Young Cade, &c. &c.) with the peculiar advantage also, of five crosses of Snap, of speedy notoriety. For further particulars as to pedigree, see Stud Books. Distingue was the best Horse of his year in Ireland, having won at Two Years old, in 1829, at the Curragh September meeting, Sweepstakes of Ten Sovereigns each, at Sst. 7lb. beating three others. On Thursday of the October meeting, same year, he won Sweepstakes of twenty-five Sovereigns, twenty forfeit, for two year old Colts, Sst. 3lb.—Fillies Sst.—Two year old Course, beating Regulator and Paget, five others paying forfeit 6 to 4 on him.—Saturday of the same meeting, he won another Sweepstakes of twenty-five Sovereigns, twenty forfeit, for Two Year Olds beating three others, two paid forfeit. The following year at the June meeting, he won Sweepstakes of Ten Sovereigns each, twenty Sovereigns added for Three Year olds, giving weight to all others of his year; and at the September meeting same year, he won the Wellington stakes of thirty Sovereigns each. At the April meeting at the Curragh, in 1831, he again won the Wellington's, giving weight to Horses older than him, and carrying several pounds more than any other of his year.—Nine started for this race, seven paid forfeit—Friday of the same meeting he won the challenge of the Wellington's, carrying six pounds more than his original weight, and the next day he won the Three Year Old King's Plate of one hundred guineas, beating five others. At the June meeting same year, he won the Kirwan Stakes of fifty Sovereigns each, beating Phillip, Pioneer, Vat, and two others, eighteen paid forfeit. On Tuesday same meeting, he won the King's plate of one hundred Guineas for four year olds, beating six others, 25 to 10 on Distingue, and after the heat 8 to 1 on him. On Friday at the Curragh October meeting following, he won the Peel Cup, with sweepstakes of one hundred Sovereigns each, beating Regulator, Pioneer paid forfeit 3 to 2 on him. In 1832 he broke down running for the Wellington's, and has since been put to Mares. The first of his get that has yet appeared in public, is a two year old Filly called the Elect, this Mare won a Handicap for two year olds, at the last October meeting at the Curragh, beating Mercury, Lounger, and Vigo, also same meeting she won the first class of the Russborough stakes, for two year olds, beating Mercury, Maggie, (winner of the Anglesey's,) and the Swap Filly.
