the doors, but O'Brien and his sons resisted them in doing so. These lands were untenanted for the last two years.

Wednesday evening, about the hour of seven o'clock, an armed party entered the dwelling house (by pushing in the door, it being only fastened by a spade being laid thereto) of Catherine O'Brien, of Cloonana, parish of Croom, and severely beat her nephew, John Cronin, who it appears lately came to reside with his aunt, when other persons dreaded he should get the small farm at the decease of the old woman. The party placed Cronin on his knees and swore him to leave the place. Informations were lodged yesterday before T. P. Vokes, Esq. by John Cronin against a man named John O'Brien, who was grand-nephew to Catherine O'Brien's late husband, for aiding and assisting in the attack,—the party fired one shot on their going away.

On Friday week last, an armed party went to the dwelling house of Mr. Edward Keating, on the lands of Ballycahane, broke into the interior, dragged him out of bed, presented two blunderbusses and a double barrellled gun at him, horse-whipped him and gave him a severe cut on the head which endangered his life. They then went to Mr. Jeffrey Keating's and endeavoured to break in his house which they could not effect. The ruffians killed a man of Keating's, named Thomas Cahill, and beat his wife within a few perches of the house. The party were right well armed, and we understand consist of a large gang. These outrages might have been prevented if Police had been stationed at Manister cross, as we before stated many outrages in that neighbourhood.

On Thursday morning, Sub-Constables Pinchin and Latchford were firing at a mark opposite the Police barrack in Kilmallock ; Latchford, after loading, was in the act of returning the ramrod of the pistol when it exploded, lodging the ball between his fore finger and thumb ; Constable Hayes, who was within a few yards of Latchford at the time, had a very narrow escape as the ball grazed him. The injury to Latchford is not very serious.

This week the arm bones and part of the skull of young Gurd, Mr. Richardson's shopman, who was blown up in the gunpowder explosion of that and the adjoining premises, were found in sifting the ruins.

Robert Leyne, a farmer, at Caherdrenna, in parish of Glanworth, near Mitchelstown, was cruelly murdered on the evening of Thursday. He had gone out, after his men had returned from work, to look alter his cattle, and not returning when he might be expected, his family became alarmed, and immediately went in search of him, when he was found in one of the drains, which his labourers had been making, dreadfully mangled, and quite insensible. He was removed to his own house, and died in a few hours.

The remains of the young man named Meskell, whose father is a corn buyer in Kilrush, and who was drowned before Christmas in the Pool, were found on the shore near Tiervoe, and brought into Kilrush on Saturday and interred.
