 judge whether it would not have been better for
 the Church of England, to rest in the oblivion
 into which she had been consigned, and whether he would
 not be wisely in exhibiting some feelings of
 indignation against the establishment, which has ever been, and in
 my opinion, the shield that protects Dissenters
 from the iron hand of Rome, which
 would otherwise have crushed them into the dust.
