Wednesday night, a woman of the name of Margaret
M'Carthy, fell headlong down a flight of back stairs, on
Arthur's-quay, and was killed, having fractured her skull
by the accident.

A new born infant was found drowned at Russell's-quay
on Thursday morning, and apparently not long in the water.
The guilty actor in this inhuman atrocity is unknown, but
conscience may punish the offender in this life.

Thursday morning, at an early hour, the remains of Mr.
Craven, who was drowned at Doonas, were found in the
waters above the Canal, by some fishermen who had been
long dragging for the bodies of that gentleman and his
servant, Madden, taken up the morning before, near
Castle Troy. Mr. Craven's remains were respectably
interred on Thursday evening in Munchin's Church, by his
friend, Mr. St. George, whose guest, the unfortuate gentle-
man had been at Castle-Connell.

There was no disturbance at the fair of Croom, on
Wednesday. Some business was done in milch cows, fat
heiffers, and sheep; but several lots left the fair without
having found a market.

Johanna Linnane was burned to death at Athkristara,
county Clare, this week, by her clothes igniting at the fire
place.

John Horgan, a lad of 13 years, was killed at a hurling
match near Tralee, on Sunday.

John M'Dermott, servant of Dr. Henry Blake, of Galway,
was killed by a fall from his master's horse on Monday.

On Tuesday, Michael Griffin, son of John Griffin, of
Ennistimon, hatter, drank muriatic acid, supposing it to be
whiskey, and died the same night.

Friday, an inquest was held by Thomas Whitestone, Esq.
Coroner, on the body of William Talbot, servant of the Rev.
Michael FitzGerald, of Kildysart, county Clare, who took
up a pistol which he was desired to clean; and whether he
shot himself, or that it went off accidentally, is unknown.
