Two women were apprehended in town this week, passing base half-crowns upon country people, under the pretence of wanting change.

A few nights since a house, the property of the Rev. William Knox, Donegal, was maliciously attacked, and the windows broken.

Thursday night, a man of respectable exterior, named Michael Lillis, from the town of Clare, was seized with a fit upon the lower quays, and died in a few hours.

The Lord Lieutenant and Privy Council have appointed Friday, the 16th inst. for the purpose of examining witnesses and hearing counsel as to the question of having two assize towns in Tipperary, as it appears the county is to be divided, and the question will be whether the town of Nenagh or Thurles is to be the new assize town with Clonmel, where they are now held.

The new gaol of Castlebar, which cost the county Mayo £26,000, is not yet inhabitable, or fit for the custody of prisoners.
