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#### Summoning Citation

(IMPERIAL ROYAL SEAL.)

THE Imperial Royal Moravian and Silesian Justice Court (Judicium delegatum) is known by the present, that the pious George Browne, deceased February 24, 1787, in his Will, December 30, 1786, published and bequeathed a Legacy of 20,000 Florins to be divided parts amongst his first born lawful male heirs, brothers William and Rutledge Browne, the deceased uncle, Ulysses Browne, residing in the Limerick, in Ireland, reserving, however, the usufruct of it to his universal heir, Anna Rosenwa...

It is further provided by the above stated Will that in case the said sons of Ulysses Browne should die without lawful male issue, the usufruct of the 20,000 Florins should fall to Mr. Lacy, Lieutenant-General in the service, son of the deceased Patricius Lacy; and in case of his death, the above mentioned capital sum of 20,000 Florins should be inherited in equal parts by the heirs of the Testator's sister, Barbara Browne, m. FitzGerald.

The death of the universal heir, Anna Browne, has put an end to the said usufruct, or life-rent, the second citation concerning the capital sum of 20,000 Florins place, therefore the interested parties are summoned by Edictal Citation to appear, either in person, or by a duly empowered agent, before this Court within a period of a year and forty-five days, viz. till June 1, 1830, to prove legally their claim to it either before this Court, or before the Substitution's Curator Doctor in Law, Johann Brunn, with the proviso, that in case of non-appearance, the above stated capital sum of 20,000 Florins should be disposed of according to the prescriptions of the established Laws.
