Parliament assembles for the dispatch of business,
on Monday, 13th of November next.

The Mayor held an inquest last Saturday at the
County Infirmary, upon the body of Catherine Kenna,
who had been admitted there with a severe injury of
the right hand, from being caught in the machinery of
a mill, and which rendered amputation necessary.
The father and uncle of the patient subsequently
attempted to remove her by force from the sick ward,
which violence it appears, considerably aggravated the
case, and accelerated her death, the jury finding a verdict
to that purport.

Michael Bourke, a labourer, died in the infirmary on
Saturday of injuries he received by falling off a ladder
at Carass, while conveying lead to the workmen at a
house there.

James Enright, one of the night wach of St. Mary's
parish is committed to prison by the Mayor, charged with
the murder of James Byrnes of Water-gate, a cooper,
about four o'clock on Sunday morning at Fish-lane,
The Mayor held an inquest upon the remains of Byrnes,
which exhibited two contusions on the head, and a
wound on the left breast from a sharp instrument which
ruptured the heart, and proved mortal. The evidence
went to show that Byrnes, the deceased had been
in company late at night, with a man named Devitt,
at Baal's-bridge, when three more, M'Namara, Cooney,
and Corbett, came up; they snatched a pipe from
Devitt, which caused some bickering, but no blows,
and they all adjourned to a cellar in the Irishtown, and
drank a pint of spirits. They returned together by the
bridge towards Mary-street, where a general row ensued,
and knock-down blows were exchanged. Byrnes, it is
stated, struck M'Namara, who called out for the watch,
and exclaimed that Byrnes had cut him with a knife.
Byrnes and the others ran, and the Watchman (Enright)
from Baal's-bridge, followed Byrnes down Fish-lane,
where it is alleged the fatal wound was given, and from
which he was seen bringing up Byrnes in a few
minutes after with assistance. Byrnes was con-
veyed to the Police station at Baal's Bridge in
a dying state, and Serjeant Daly desired him be
removed home at once, where he expired in a short
time. The jury found some difficulty in coming to a
verdict, eleven of them finding that the homicide was
perpetrated by James Enright, the watchman, and the
other being of opinion it should be by persons

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
