DEATHS.

On the 22d inst. at Piccadilly, London, after a tedious illness, William Hawkins Bourne, Esq. of Terenure, near Dublin.—Rarely has it been our province to record the death of one more generally respected by the higher ranks in this country, or more beloved by the trading and labouring classes, with all of whom the extensive sphere of his business, as the original proprietor of mail and stage coaches in Ireland, brought him into frequent intercourse. Mr. Bourne was no less eminently distinguished for his happy accomplishments as a scholar, than for his fascinating manners as a perfect gentleman. Few in his time had greater opportunities, and none turned them, in every instance, to more advantage, for the improvement of his native country, and the comfort as well as benefit of its inhabitants. His life was constantly devoted to measures of public utility; and well may he be esteemed a practical patriot. He it was that first established a Mail Coach between this City and Dublin; while by pushing the sphere of his operations, he also opened new and unexplored sources of profit to the merchant and agriculturist throughout the South of Ireland, by forming splendid roads, and providing safe and expeditious conveyances on various lines of route. His large establishment gave employment to a vast number of persons, who will deeply deplore the loss of their benefactor. Seldom has the grave closed over an individual whose private virtues, independent of his enterprise and acknowledged worth in public life, more endeared the possessor to the affectionate regard of all good men.
