

...Mary Healy, wife to the witness, sworn—
the 14th December; witness went to mass in company
with her; when leaving the house she locked the door;
missed Mary Healy at the chapel; when she returned
home the door was open, and her husband said the
money was stolen.

Serjeant Riedy searched both prisoners, and found in
their possession some notes, which Healy could not
swear to as his property; found a crown piece with the
female, which he identified. Verdict, Healy not Guilty,
The wife Guilty.

John Connell was charged with violently assaulting
Mary Nunan, in Newgate-lane, so that her life was
endangered.

Mary Nunan, sworn—The prisoner lived in the same
house with her; he was beating a woman named Biddy
Dillon; witness thought to prevent him; he struck
witness with a brick on the head, knocked her down,
and kicked her; he also took a child of her's, and
dashed it against the ground.

Doctor Thwaites, sworn—Mary Nunan was taken
into Hospital; her life was in danger; she had a fright-
ful wound on the head, and was much bruised; she was
confined for six weeks.—Guilty, with a recommendation,
To be imprisoned one month, and pay £1 to prosecutrix,
or in default three months and hard labour.

Catherine Bromell, jun. and Catherine Bromell, sen.
for stealing several articles of wearing apparel from the
residence of Francis Wilkinson, Esq.

Mr. Wilkinson, sworn—Missed the articles from his
residence on the 30th October; they were in his house
the evening before; went to the watch-house and saw
the articles which he at once identified as his, a frock
coat, two waistcoats, one trowsers, a jacket, two shirts,
a pillow case, a pair of boots, &c.

John Hayes, watchman, deposed to having apprehended
the prisoners in the streets, with the clothes
in their possession; asked them where they got them
and the mother replied that they were belonging to Mr.
Wilkinson. Verdict, Guilty, with a recommendation
from the jury.

Jeremiah Tuthill, Esq. and John Fitzgerald were
charged with an assault on John Barry, while executing
a writ from the Provincial Bank, for the sum of £1,422
8s. on Mr. Tuthill.

John Barry, sworn—Received an order from the
managers of the Provincial Bank, on Mr. Jeremiah
Tuthill, for the sum of £1,422 8s.; went to look for
Mr. Tuthill at Mr. Allen's, the Apothecary's, in Shan-
non-street; asked Mr. Allen if Mr. Tuthill was there;
Mr. Allen replied he was not, that he would find him
in Henry-street; heard that Mr. Tuthill was at Mr.
Wheeler's house at dinner; went to Mr. Wheeler's
house, and waited about the place for an hour; when
Mr. Tuthill came out, witness offered him the writ, but
he refused to take it, and struck him (witness); there
was another person with Mr. Tuthill; he believes it
was a servant man of Mr. Wheeler's; witness was struck
and knocked down by Mr. Tuthill and his arm dislo-
cated; witness took Mr. Tuthill by the collar, and
dragged him into a shop, where he read the copy of the
writ for him; put the writ between Mr. Tuthill's coat
and waistcoat.

Cross-examined by Mr. Boyse—I enquired at Mr.
Allen's for Mr. Tuthill; I was not drunk that night;
I went to get my arm set to Doctor Franklin's, but he
was out; got it dressed at Mr. Bouchier's.

Barry's son corroborated his testimony.
Mr. Edw. Parker, Apothecary at Mr. Bouchier's,
stated that Barry went to him on the night in question;
that his arm was dislocated; that he appeared to be
drunk; the accident of which he complained generally
happened by a fall.

Mr. John Allen, Apothecary, was sworn, and said
that Barry never went to his house to inquire for Mr
Tuthill that night. Not Guilty.

Patrick Hamilton, a man of decent appearance and
master of one of the Canal Navigation Company's
boats, was indicted for stealing a hat, out of a case,
which had been shipped on board boat No. 887, under
direction for Mr. Morrissy, Tipperary, from a manu-
factory in Dublin.

John Dowling, belonging to Messrs. Stanley and
Co. of Dublin sworn.—Recollects having packed 36
hats in a case under cover for Mr. Morrissy, Tippe-
rary, and gave them in charge to the porter to be left
on board the boat; knew the quantity of hats he
packed; (a list was here produced) thinks the one
shewn him is one of the same quality as he packed.

John Browne sworn—Is Porter at Messrs. Stanley's,
Lower Ormond-quay, Dublin; got a case of hats from
Mr. Dowling to leave at the Shannon Navigation
Company's office, in Dublin, directed to Mr. Mor-
rissy, Tipperary got a receipt at the office where he
delivered the case.

Mr. William Sibthorpe, on being sworn stated,
that as agent to the company in Limerick, he felt it
his duty to bring forward this case. He said that the
prisoner was Master of one of the Company's boats,
No. 887; that he got sick a few weeks since, and in
consequence was unable to keep the command of his
boat, and during his illness another had been tempo-
rarily appointed. On the 6th December, his boat
arrived in this city, when he found he was able to
resume command, which he did; on the cargo being
discharged there was a hat case on board, and
on being removed to the store, at the canal,
it was observed that it had been lightened of a hat;
got the case weighed and found it was a pound lighter
than when it was weighed in Dublin; opened the case,
and it was then evident a hat had been taken out, as
there was a vacancy for one; enquired about it of Daly
who had care of the vessel to Limerick, and he knew
nothing of it; he then made a search and found in the
prisoner's box the hat; it had not cover or paper about
it; he was not in care of the vessel to Limerick, but
had then joined it for her next trip; asked him if the

At his father's house, at the Abbey, Ennis, on Friday, William
Crowe, Esq. son of Thomas Crowe, Esq. The death of a child
dearly beloved, however the affliction may be expected by
a previous lingering illness, and from which no hope of recovery
could be looked for, inflicts a pang upon the family and friends
that is deeply distressing. Such has been the case of the young
gentleman whose death we have this day to record. For nearly
three years he had been afflicted with severe bodily suffering,

bosom of his Saviour. This is a cherished consolation to his

5th year of his age, John C. Ryan, Esq. Resident Apothecary
and Superintendent of the Limerick General Dispensary, a
situation which he held little more than two years after his late
brother, when falling thus prematurely a victim to fever, caught
in discharge of the onerous duties at all hours incident to
that public charity. This lamentable event happens to be a
calamity of no ordinary nature in his person, for the insti-
tution loses an assiduous, humane and skilful functionary,
a society a gentleman of mild, unassuming deportment, strict
rectitude, and unblemished character; while his truly afflicted
family are bereaved of a relative most exemplary in all domes-
tic duties and obligations, without which comfort or happi-
ness in any sphere of life is but a name.
