TERMS.

For Board, and Instruction in Logics, Mathematics, Greek, Latin, Composition in both languages, Geography, History, (both Ancient and Modern), Chronology (with Memoria Technica,) Arithmetic, (in which two last branches the master is engaged to instruct,) 45 GUINEAS ANNUM, with no extra charge, except for board and washing, and for each of these the charge is sixteen shillings per quarter; there will be an additional charge of one shilling each quarter for the board and washing.

The attendance of the most approved French, Music, and other accomplishments, provided on the most reasonable terms possible, will, of course, be optional with the Parents of the Pupils, whether those additional charges be incurred.

Each Pupil will bring on his entrance, a Pair of new Linen Sheets, and six Towels. In case those articles are not sent, a charge of five pounds will be made in the first quarter's account.

PAYMENTS TO BE MADE QUARTERLY, on the 15th of January,—15th of April,—15th of July, and 15th of October; and to avoid misapprehension it is laid down as a rule that should a Pupil be absent previous to the arrival of one of those dates, the quarter is to be settled for. No notice of absence of a Pupil is required. No daily Pupils will be admitted. A calendar month will be allowed for absence at Christmas, and the same period at Midsummer. On holidays will be given, except Good Friday and Monday.

Nantenan Glebe is a dry healthful situation, about three and a half miles of Rathkeale (next to the best Market Town in the County,) and a mile and a half of Askeaton; the Glebe is perfectly retired, having no village near it.

For further particulars as to capability, &c. Mr. Coghlan refers to Rev. Dr. Singe, who was his tutor. To Rev. Dr. Martin Killeshandra, under whom most of Mr. Coghlan's Pupils entered College,—to Mr. Carson, F.T.C. who was educated by Mr. C. to Rev. Robert Pringle, more Glebe, Co. Cork, who was a Candidate for the degree of Bachelor of Arts; to Venerable Archdeacon Warburton, who was for two years under Mr. Coghlan's tuition; to Mr. H.
