The Rev. Mr. Wren, was interrupted reading the funeral service over a Protestant at Palliskerry church on Sunday, and the Police were called in to restore order.

The Rev. Mr. Armstrong, Rector of Templemore, is dangerously ill.

On Wednesday evening last, while the congregation were assembled during the performance of divine worship, at Carlow church, some ruffians created the greatest alarm by smashing the window over the communion table with a large stone, which fell near one of the pews. This is the third similar outrage.

Sunday a sermon on behalf of the Masonic Orphan Asylum, Cork, was delivered in Christ Church by the Rev. J. N. Lombard. The collection amounted to £105. The church was densely thronged.

The Rev. J. N. Lombard is appointed to the living Carrigaline, Cork, vacant by the death of the Rev. George Townsend.

The Sheriff of Carlow is much censured in that county, for excluding Protestants in almost every instance from the panels at Assizes and Quarter Sessions, and the consequence is, the return of verdicts in the teeth of evidence.

Mr. Sharpe of Ballinasloe is elected High Constable of Clonmacnoo barony, county Galway, in place of the late Mr. Burke.

Mr. Freeman decreed a multitude of country people to Loughrea Quarter Sessions for non-payment of rates, and sentenced two prisoners to transportation.

The contract for the completion of the new docks and quays at Galway terminated on the 31st December last, and yet they are little better than half-finished.

Mr. Martin, M. P. and Captain O'Flaherty, of Clonmellon, have both been dismissed from the Commission of the Peace for Galway, on account of the recent collision between their respective tenantry near Waterford, where both gentlemen lay claim to a large tract of bog.

The Rev. Horace Cholmondeley has again come forward with a contribution of £100 to the O'Connell fund.

A requisition is in progress for a county meeting at Clonmellon, to take into consideration the provisions of the proposed bill for the relief of the poor in this country.

Monday, a dreadful accident occurred in Rathvilly, where a man named Cain went into the house of a spirit retailer, to get some whiskey, on returning he fell down stairs and broke his neck.

A number of Presbyterians have been dispossessed of their interests on Lord Templemore's land in Derry. The Roman Catholics put in their place. There was only one of the latter persuasion on the Burt estate, some few years ago.

On the 6th instant the Presbytery of Cavan ordained the Rev. Hugh Pollock to the pastoral charge of the congregation of Ballyjamesduff.

The Boundary Surveyors employed in taking the Ordnance Survey of the County Kilkenny, when on the lands of Esker, on Friday last, were attacked by the country people and obliged to fly. The Surveyors were enabled to complete their survey two days later—not under the protection of the Police, but of the Priest.
