CITY COURT-WEDNESDAY.

At nine o'clock Mr. Justice Perrin took his place on the Bench.

Mary Moriarty was tried and found guilty of stealing an handkerchief from Messrs. Todd and Co. which was taken from under arm by a shop boy.

Michael Sheedy was indicted for manslaughter, having violently assaulted Hannah Crotty, whereof she died.

James Crotty, the husband of deceased, proved that he and the prisoner had a dispute, and that prisoner struck witness and the deceased, whom he kicked after knocking her down, and that she died from the effects ten days after in Hospital.

For the defence, Mullins, who had been indicted for the crime, but acquitted, there being no prosecution, was sworn—He deposed that Crotty and his wife were both drunk and "fastened" a fight upon the prisoner; a scuffle ensued between Crotty and the prisoner, and the wife took up a stool and struck prisoner with it; in the struggle she fell, but received neither blows nor-kieks; the deceased came in a short time after to beg pardon, and attributed the entire to whiskey; the row occurred in the prisoner's room.

Michael Mullins corroborated the last witness.

Guilty of manslaughter.

James Enright, a watchman, was indicted for the wilful murder of James Byrnes, in Mary-street, on the night of the 14th of December last.

Mr. Bennett, on the part of the Crown, stated to the court, that as there were many witnesses to be examined, and as the principal witness was dead, he would propose to examine the surgeon first, in order to ascertain if the wounds could be inflicted by the watchman's pole.

Court—There can be no objection to such a course, as it will save time.

Surgeon Franklin sworn—Examined the body of the deceased; found a wound on the left breast which penetrated the heart; it could not be inflicted by the pole, and if it had, it would take a different direction; it looked as if it were inflicted by a penknife, for it cut through the clothes as if done with a knife; it could

not be effected with a watchman's pole.

Mr. Bennett—Then, my Lord, we shall not press
the case further, as we have no proof of the prisoner's
having any other weapon about him at the time than
his pole; it would be a waste of time, and therefore
we give up the case.

Not Guilty. The prisoner was then discharged, amidst the hootings of an immense crowd collected outside the Court.

John Madden and John Donoghue were indicted for a riot, and grievous assault on Winthrop Maunsell, Esq. the 2d of January last, at Killonan. They were also indicted for administering to him an unlawful oath,

binding him not to demand any tithes.

Mr. Winthrop Maunsell deposed that he was directed to call upon five farmers in the neighbourhood of Killonan, to come in and pay their tithes to his brother who is Rector of Kilmurry; was met by the prisoners and others on the road, who gathered round him, tore his papers, struck him with sticks, knocked him down, broke one of his fingers with a blow, placed him on his knees to swear that he never would go to that or any other place to look for tithes; the prisoner, O Dinoghue, collared him, and held him while the prisoner, Madden, bid him swear what they demanded; refused doing so; Madden struck him on the head with a stick; was kicked when lying on the ground; lost his eye sight for a few minutes; he
