Chief, Lyon M'Kenzie, has published a narrative of the late attempt to organise insurrection in Canada, from the outbreak to its fruitless termination. He declares in contradiction to Papineau, that the revolt was not accidental, nor caused by the issue of warrants against persons hostile to the Government. According to M'Kenzie it was on the 7th of November, that Thursday, the 7th of November, should be the day for the assembling of the "sons of freedom" at Montgomery's, whence they were to march to Toronto, seize the arms, disperse the F. Head, and proclaim a republic. The matter was left to his management, but an "Executive" was named to correspond with Papi- and it was agreed on that the Executive should not alter the day on which the revolt was to take place, without consulting with him (M'Kenzie) in any instance. He had given the captains of the regiments sealed orders for the Thursday, but, to his surprise, he learned that the Executive had ordered the men with their arms, on the Monday of the day first fixed on. It was found to be necessary to countermand the Monday's assemblage, and a rising took place partially and prematurely. M'Kenzie's account of the pluck of his fellow-rebels is not very creditable to them. At all events he has said enough to prove that Sir Francis Head was more to the blunders of his opponents than his own wisdom.

The encampment of tents extended considerably at both sides of the course, and the first day's meeting passed off to admiration.
