A woman of the name of Catherine Shaughnessy, who had been missing from her family near a month, was found floating this day, near the Steam packet quay. The Mayor held an inquest upon the body, which exhibited distinct marks of violence evidently before death. The husband was examined on the inquiry, but pretended he did not know his wife, though the deceased was immediately recognised by her own daughter. There was a verdict of wilful murder against persons unknown. The husband, who betrayed great indifference, is committed on suspicion. The unfortunate woman, it is understood, was *enciente*.

A sailor fell out of a vessel at the lower quays to-day, and was drowned, his messmates rendering but little assistance to save him from a premature death.

The sentence at last Assizes of 7 years transportation upon John Donoghue and John Madden, for a violent and grievous assault upon Mr. Winthrop Maunsell, at Killonan, has, on memorial, been commuted by Lord Mulgrave to six months' confinement and hard labour. The application for mitigation of punishment was signed by Mr. James B. Boyd, and the other Jurors also by the Rev. William Maunsell.

This day, a draft from the 73d Depot at Clare Castle, comprising Ensign Browne, with eleven rank and file, marched in here on route to Cork, to embark for the Service Companies in Upper Canada. Capt. Harvey and twelve men of the depot escort them to Cork.

The Magistrates of Tipperary are summoned this day at Cashel, to investigate the circumstances of Mr. Cooper's murder, and three of the principals are reported to be in custody. Mr. Weyland is badly wounded in the back, and his horse received a shot in the eye. John Wilcocks, Esq. Police Magistrate, and Chief Constable Blake, have instituted a most active pursuit of the murderers, and it is hoped their labors will be crowned with success.
