The central situation of Limerick adjoining several large counties, leads the Directors of the Institution established here, confidently to hope, that its benefits will be widely and extensively felt, and that it will prove an efficient instrument in preventing a large proportion of individual suffering. The small amount of payment required will bring its advantages within the reach of many, who cannot effect common insurance. A person of moderate income for instance, under 30, nominating his wife, aged 25, is only required to pay the sum of 16s. for difference of age, and an annual Premium of £2, (being less than 10d. per week,) to secure an annuity for her whenever his death may occur; while those of larger present emoluments, from office or otherwise, may insure considerable annuities to their families, by an increased number of similar payments, not exceeding six, no member being allowed to take more than that number. The facilities afforded by the plan will enable persons of the most limited incomes to marry, by giving them an opportunity of securing Life Annuities for their wives, should they survive them. Wherever, in fact, such a Society is established, no family can be left wholly unprotected for, except through the utter improvidence or apathy of those whose duty it is, while life and health remain to see that the objects of their present care and affection may not hereafter be subjected to the pangs of humiliating want, while it can be prevented at so small a sacrifice. To alleviate the evils of humanity—to divide amongst many the pressure of individual suffering, is the object of the Society, and it is gratifying to the Directors to find that these principles are beginning to be more fully understood, and in proportion to receive the sanction of public support, evinced by the increasing number of its members. To see the Society flourish and extend its benefits widely around is their first wish and desire, and the flattering hope, that even when they, and those who now co-operate with them, shall have passed beyond the cares and anxieties of the present life, their labours will be gratefully remembered by the widow and the orphan, is a cheering motive to the Directors to persevere in their efforts, and amply repays them for their past exertions. THE Commissioners of Stamps and Taxes hereby give Notice, in pursuance of the Statute in that case made and provided, that they intend to discontinue the use of the several Types, Stamps, and Marks now used for denoting on paper the Stamp Duties payable in Ireland, under and by virtue of a certain Act of Parliament in force in Ireland, upon and in respect of any "Bill of Exchange, Promissory Note, Post Bill or Draft, or Order for the "payment of money," and also upon any "Receipt or Discharge for money, or on the delivery "of money, or on the delivery of any Check, Draft, Bill, or other Order for money," and that in lieu thereof, they have provided and intend to use certain new particular and appropriated Types, Stamps, and Marks, having thereon certain altered Devices or Marks for denoting the said Duties upon the said several Instruments; which new Types, Stamps, and Marks, will denote the amount of the Duty in words, and will contain an impression of the Crown and Harp, together with certain figures denoting the day of the month and year upon which the same shall have been stamped or impressed at Her Majesty's Stamp Office in the City of Dublin, and those applicable to Bills and Notes will also contain the words "Bill or Note," and those applicable to Receipts and Discharges will contain the word "Receipt."

And the said Commissioners do hereby further give Notice, that if any of the Instruments upon which such Duties are imposed by law, shall, from and after the Seventeenth day of July ensuing, being one lunar month from the publication of this notice in the Dublin Gazette, (viz. the 19th June, 1838,) be written or printed on paper not marked with the particular Types, Stamps, or Marks, so provided and appropriated as aforesaid, the same will be of no other effect than if written or printed on paper not marked or stamped, and the parties writing or printing or using the same, will be subject to the penalties imposed on persons writing or printing the same upon paper not marked or stamped.
