GAME.

Post-Office, Limerick, 15th August, 1838.

It is hereby given that a penalty of £20 is imposed by having, keeping, or using, for the destruction of Game, any Dog or Gun, a powder engine, without having a Game Certificate or Game-keeper's Certificate. Also by acting as Game-keeper without having the latter Certificate.

Whoever shall be met in pursuit of Game, the Game-keeper, or proprietor, &c. of the land, or any person without a Game Certificate then in force, and produce on demand of him the production of such Certificate, and if he shall refuse to produce it, or give the name and residence, or shall give the name or fictitiously, he will incur a penalty of £20 (5 George III. cap. 100.)

The Persons obtaining Certificates since the 1st of March (when all Certificates previously issued) will be shortly published. And in the List can be inspected.

The Marquis of Normanby has intended to make a short detour to the south-west, and with that intention will visit the town, take a glance at the Fergus, view the cliffs of Moher, and is expected at Ennis-murphy the mansion of Andrew Finucane, Esq. to-morrow.

The House of Lords, on Thursday last, gave the amended Bill a third reading. The House will have to pass judgment on the amendments of the Lordships, and the ultimate fate of the Bill, is yet uncertain.

On Wednesday last, at the Ballinasloe Petty Sessions, James Hannigan was fined 15s. for assaulting the police whilst in the execution of their duty. The prisoner, in whose behalf Counsellor Fallon appeared, complained that he was wounded in the hand by one of the police, named James Loaten, who made several attempts to stab him with his bayonet; it appeared the policeman used the weapon only in his own defence. Michael Phillips was fined £2, or a month's imprisonment for an assault on Harriet Street, a female in the service of Archdeacon Butson. The Magistrates were inclined to send the case to the jury, but at the instance of Mr. Butson it was disposed of summarily.

As two labourers in the employ of Alexander Sim, Esq. of Collooney, were preparing to blast rocks in the quarry near that town, on Tuesday, a spark fell into the hole where the powder was; an explosion took place, and the unfortunate men were blown a considerable distance. The sufferers presented an awful spectacle—not a feature could be distinguished in their faces—the eyes were literally shot out, and the heads shattered in a frightful manner.

Horse racing and canoe racing take place every week this season at Kilkee.

A canoe containing five persons was upset near the shore of Lahinch, on Saturday, in a heavy swell, when a youth of 13 years, named Frost, unfortunately perished. His body was found same evening.

Lough Derg Regatta, Upper Shannon, commenced yesterday.

A great meeting is expected at Ennis races on Friday. Most of the horses from Miltown races are already entered.

Cattle dealers attending the fairs this month purpose shipping live stock for the London market, direct from this port, by the *Londonderry* and *Thames* steam-packets, which will be on the line in a few days. The novel idea of placing both these powerful vessels on the Limerick and London trade, has created quite a sensation. It will at all events cause a spirited rivalry with the Shipping Company, whose well found, fast-sailing schooners have hitherto enjoyed the preference, and deservedly. A great question, however, will be the scale of freights, as these vessels are known to make the passage in four days and even less. We doubt if the steamers can possibly accomplish it in three.

Margaret Hennessy, an aged woman, who had been knocked down by a horse and car at Pallas-Kerry last week, died in hospital on Sunday. The Mayor held an inquest, but the jury did not conceive her death was caused by that circumstance; and returned a verdict that she died of general debility and decay.
