It is a regret to state that no portion of the fund so expected by many persons employed in public works in the county Clare, under Grand Jury presentment, has yet been paid out by Government. The Advance Bill was passed into law last session,

Indeed all their ingenuity will be required to sustain their cause and their characters."

A countrywoman of the name of Honora O'Brien, who came privately into town for that purpose on the previous day, was delivered on Wednesday, at Curry's-lane, of a healthy male infant. In a few hours after the woman of the house observed the infant dead in the mother's arms, the string of the cap being drawn tight round the infant's neck.—The unfortunate woman was placed in custody, and the Mayor yesterday held an inquest, when the jury found the infant died by neglect of some persons, but had not sufficient evidence to attach guilt to the parent. The offspring it is thought was illegitimate.

The weather since Wednesday has been almost uninterruptedly fine for harvest labour.

The General Quarter Sessions for this City and Liberties, will commence on Tuesday, the 2d of next month.

Sir John Burke is to be the new Vice-Lieutenant of the county Galway, in the absence of his nephew, Lord Clanricarde, at Petersburg, and James O'Hara, of Leniboy, Esq. is appointed Deputy Lieutenant.

Tobias Burke and William Ahern, whose murder in the County Tipperary we announced last week, have both left widows and numerous families. They were stoned to death. A verdict of wilful murder is found. A Tipperary correspondent says—"There is not a town in this kingdom, of its population, where more spirits is annually consumed; nor is there a town where more people, returning from it, have been murdered, than this."

No armed party of men, as reported in another quarter, prevented Mr. Brazill's workmen cutting some corn in dispute between him and some persons near Patrick's-Well.

We are happy to perceive that an attempt is being made by the Citizens for the removal of the paltry but injurious tax exacted from Pedestrians at the Wellesly Bridge.

The tolls of Galway are to be sold on the 1st October by the Town Commissioners.

The Bank of Ireland have refused to admit into their establishment the statue of the late Henry Grattan, from the Royal Exchange.

The sale of ore at Swansea from Irish mines realised £6042 on the 5th instant.

The trustees of the Molyneux Asylum, Dublin, are to elect a Chaplain to that institution the 12th of next month, in room of the late Rev. Mr. Lloyd.

A bequest of £150 by the late William Bleazby, Esq. Cork, was this week distributed amongst the Charities of that City.
