BRUTAL AND REVOLTING HOMICIDE.—Saturday
 night last, between the hours of eleven and twelve
 o'clock, two men named John and Michael Connell,
 brothers-in-law, who had been drinking in company,
 passed over the temporary timber-bridge to Thomond-
 gate, and were heard to exchange menacing language.
 John Connell retorted the threats of the other, who
 had laid hold on him. A struggle ensued, and Michael
 Connell was dashed against the ground, his assailant
 leaping, with savage exultation, upon the body of the
 prostrate man, and grasping in that state his head
 and ears, with both hands struck his head with full
 force against the stones three times, and then finished
 his helpless victim, by a kick in the throat, followed
 by a ferocious remark that he (John Connell) had
 done his job. A low suppressed groan was heard from
 the dying man, who ceased to exist immediately, and
 the murderer leisurely walked away, without mole-
 station. The police went in pursuit soon after, and
 discovered John Connell in a field near his own house,
 in Thomond-gate. This horrid outrage was perpetrated
 in a close populous neighbourhood. On Sunday the
 Mayor held an inquest upon the remains of Michael
 Connell, when several witnesses were examined.—
 Mr. Allen, the Apothecary at Barrington's Hospital,
 deposed to most extensive lacerated wounds in the
 back of the head, and bruises on the neck. Surgeon
 Franklin proved a very extensive contused wound on
 the head, and severe bruises on the neck, especially
 below the ear. There was extensive laceration and
 rupture of the blood-vessels of the brain, and a quan-
 tity of coagulated blood. Bridget Moylan saw the
 Connells struggling with each other; saw John kick
 the deceased in the ear, after he had thrown him
 down; when she approached Michael was dead.
 Luke Croughan came up to separate them, but some-
 one said the Connells were brothers-in-law, and not
 to interfere. When one of them was flung down, saw
 the other lean over him, and heard three knocks
 against the ground, as if the head against a stone, and
 before that, the man had received a kick in the neck.
 John Halpin saw the two men on the ground, one
 over the other; heard the wife of one say, "*well
 done, but don't beat him down!*"; saw John Connell
 repeatedly strike Michael's head against the pavement,
 holding him by the hair and ears, and then giving him
 a kick in the head. Mary O'Donnell, confirmed this
 testimony, she saw the man dead immediately after
 the barbarous usage. The verdict of the Jury was
 that Michael Connell was killed by John Connell, of
 Mass lane, labourer.
