low-citizens, to whom his perfectly gentlemanlike manners, refined
sense of honor, and affable deportment, had long endeared their
possessor in a singular degree. In private society, he was the fond
parent, sincere friend, and generous benefactor—exemplary alike in
the discharge of all the moral and religious duties. To his near re-
latives, and tenderly beloved family, this sad visitation must prove
the fleeting nature of human excellence, in the loss of one whose
virtues are embalmed in the fond memory of his domestic circle.
With them it is a calamity which the merciful regard of an all wise
Providence, and the soothing hand of time, can alone mitigate.
