The funeral of the late Robert George Maunsell,
Esq. of this City, took place on Monday, at twelve
o'clock, when the body of this much esteemed gentle-
man was conveyed from his house at the Crescent, to
the family burying place, St. John's Church. The
procession comprised all the resident wealth and res-
pectability of Limerick, of every denomination, and
upwards of forty private equipages followed the mourn-
ful cavalcade. The funeral carriage was drawn by six
horses, in sable trappings, behind which walked as
chief mourners, Robert T. Maunsell, Esq. son of the
deceased, Henry Maunsell, Esq. brother of the
deceased, and his brothers-in-law, the Hon. John
Massy, and Eyre Evans, of Ashill Towers, Esq.; next
the Mayor, Sheriffs, and members of the Corporation,
a numerous cortege of private gentlemen, merchants,
traders, and shopkeepers, who had all assembled to
tender the last sad tribute to departed worth.
The Church choir chaunted the appropriate psalms,
and the Rev. Dawson Massy delivered a most affecting
and pathetic funeral panegyric, in which he alluded to
the virtues of the deceased, his edifying deportment,
as a christian, a husband, and a parent. The picture
was truly drawn, all present felt the full force of the
Rev. gentleman's exhortation. The usual funeral anthem
was performed, and Mr. Francis Ranelow presided at
the organ, assisted by his father and the choristers of
the Cathedral. The vocal and instrumental service
was admirable, having been all got up under the super-
intendence of Mr. F. Ranelow.

By the lamented demise of Robert Geo. Maunsell,
Esq. and of John Brownrigg, Esq. Engineer to the
Inland Canal Navigation, large pensions revert
to the Crown. The latter was many years officially
connected with this district, and universally respected.
