LETTER FROM MR. O'CONNELL.

The following letter from Mr. O'Connell, which he feels it his duty to publish, He is proceeding to carry the letter into effect:—

Abbey, 12th October, 1838.

I am with considerable reluctance in three weeks I must leave all my mountain home, and involve myself in political exertion. In the mean time I must have everything ready to receive my arrival in Dublin. We must proceed with firmness in laying the foundation, the "Precursor Society." The success of our present efforts depends on the opinion amongst the people is to obtain justice for the people or united parliament.

My experiment in such a manner as to convince every Irishman that there is no other way of being righted by any other means.

IMPORTANT TO GROCERS AND SPIRIT RETAILERS.—Directions have been issued from the Lords' Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury to the Board of Excise signifying, that for the purpose of obviating, as far as possible, any just cause of complaint on the parts of Grocers and Spirit retailers, in carrying into effect the Act 6, and 7 William IV, chap. 38, which has, from the termination of the last Session of Parliament, come into operation, Retailers of Spirits in Ireland, being duly licensed to trade in, vend, and sell, Coffee, Tea, &c. for the the current year may have a renewal of their Publican License—provided they withdraw their entries as Grocers, and that they surrender their Grocer's Licenses, previously endorsing upon such License, a memorandum signed by them that they "have discontinued the business of a Grocer," and that such License is delivered up to be cancelled. The Collectors of Excise are authorised, thereupon to repay the amount of such Licences to the respected traders.
