Major Ruxton, 34th, and Captain Whitty, 8th, have landed from Canada at Liverpool.

Major Wilkinson, is about to retire from the pay mastership of the Royal Dragoons, much to the regret of his brother officers.

The 48th Regt. under Lieut.-Col. Bell, arrived at Gibraltar on the 1st of October, in the Hercules, 74, after a passage of ten days only from Cork. Lieut.-Gen. Sir R. Jackson inspected head-quarters of the 86th Regt. at Stockport, on the 15th inst. under the command of Colonel Sir M. Creagh, K.H. and was pleased to express his high approbation of the state of efficiency and discipline, as well as the order and regularity of the interior economy, in all its branches.

The half-yearly inspection of that distinguished corps, the 95th, was made at Salford Barrack, Manchester, on the 18th instant, by Sir R. Jackson, K.C.B. No Regiment in the Service can surpass this in efficiency and discipline as well as order and regularity.

Lieut. and Adjutant Day, and Lieut. Alston, 99th Regt. have returned to Athlone from leave. Capt. Smyley, Lieut. Warren, and Ensign Jauncy, are gone on leave in this country, and Ensign Hope, is gone on leave to England.

Major General Sir Thomas Pearson left Armagh on Thursday, to inspect the Royal Artillery at Charlemont, and 22d Regiment at Belfast.

Ensigns Williams and Straubenzee, 13th Light Infantry, and Ensign Sadleir, 41st, have sailed for India; and other officers have asked leave to join their corps upon that continent, in preference to staying with the Depots at Chatham until next year.

Lord Glenlyon, Scots Greys, is giving a series of splendid entertainments to his friends in Perthshire, and at a grand ball this week all the guests wore, by request, the Highland costume.

The inspection of the 99th at Athlone, by Sir John Buchan, which passed off with such eclat, reflects great credit on the Colonel, officers, and men of that corps; while much praise is also given to Ensign Hope, a young officer, who has for some weeks acted as temporary Adjutant of the 99th, with considerable zeal, tact, and assiduity.

The Nenagh Police have discovered in that town, a quantity of soldiers clothes and accoutrements belonging to the Templemore garrison.

Notwithstanding the coronation promotion of officers, the official Navy List exhibits the following decrease in the last quarter, viz. three captains, two commanders, ten Lieutenants, 21 Surgeons, and 15 assistant surgeons.

The King's German Legion, which served with so much distinction under the Duke of Wellington in Spain and Portugal, and was disbanded at the close of the war, is re-embodied by the King of Hanover, who will not allow them to bear the words Peninsula and Waterloo on their colours and cap plates.

There was a sale of several cast horses from the Royal Dragoons at Cork, to-day.

Sir Thos. McMahon on his inspection of Portsmouth garrison, found the men's firelocks generally most inefficient, one in five missing at repeated trials.

Captain Nugent's troop 3d Dragoon Guards has left Hulme barracks for Lancaster.

A. H. Tonge, Esq. is appointed to be a company in the Wilts Militia, vice Codrington, resigned.

A sergeant of the 4th Dragoon Guards arrested at Ipswich, last week, the landlord of a public-house, on suspicion that he was a deserter from the Regt. some years before. The landlord whose name is Burns, summoned the sergeant before the Magistrates, who fined him the costs, when he apologised for the mistake.

There is just now great scarcity of Engineer officers in the British service, and the number available is quite insufficient for the duty. There are at least 25 more required at this moment.

Captain W——, 23d Fusiliers, is, Hymen fancies, about to marry a Northern heiress.

Mr. O'Connell, in a letter to the *Liverpool Mercury*, vindicating his assertion that the majority of England is bigotedly hostile to Ireland, repeats the endless tale of his personal sacrifices for Ireland—that he gave up his profession, which only in a stuff gown brought him £8,000 a year, and that within the last few months he had refused the rank and emoluments of Chief Baron of the Exchequer—which he adds has more patronage than any other seat on the Judicial Bench.

The late Mr. Peter Stone, of Usher's-quay, Dublin, has left £200 to the Roman Catholic Charities.

The Radicals registered 237 votes for the town of Galway at Quarter Sessions this week; Conservatives none!

Sir Valentine Blake has served notice in the *Gazette* of the application for improving Lough Corrib.

A boy on board a yacht at Cove met with a serious accident on Wednesday morning. He had taken the tinder-box for the purpose of "striking a light," and a spark from the box falling among some powder in a flask near him, but which he had not previously observed, the powder exploded, and injured him severely. The abdomen was frightfully torn.

On Thursday last the Right Rev. Dr. Ryan visited the Chapel of St. Patrick's, Clare-street, and after having addressed a crowded and attentive congregation for more than an hour, in effective, eloquent, and appropriate language, he administered confirmation to 265 children. On a recent occasion he also visited the chapel of Monaleen, in the east Liberties, and confirmed 290 children.

The Nenagh Temperance Society is fast progressing in its good works.

Sir Benjamin Morris is appointed a Magistrate for the county as well as the city Waterford.

Lord Glengall patronises Mr. Quin's mission in support of the Railway Commissioners, as the Killenny line running through Nenagh, would, his Lordship contends, cut out almost entirely the county Tipperary.

A mad dog having been killed in the streets of Newry, the Magistrates issued an order to confine all dogs for a month, and the Police have got orders to destroy any they find abroad.

Mr. Pierce Joyce, of Merview, was chairman of an anti-tithe meeting at Kitolla, county Galway, on Sunday, which broke up with three groans for "Sharman Crawford and Father Davoren!"

The Hon. Colonel Vereker now preferred a charge against defendant, for an assault, and having been sworn stated—that as he was returning through Gort on Friday, on his way home to Loughcooter, after being out shooting, he was abruptly accosted by defendant, and asked to produce his license, and to say by what authority he carried a gun; defendant presenting a license, said, as he had been on the same day required for his, he should now make the same demand on the Colonel; witness passed on unheeding the interruption, and Killen seized the gun. He (Col. Vereker) could not say whether it was he, or a man named Pat Reily, one of the assistants, who had come up, had taken the piece out of his hand, or whether both, in the scuffle, might have done so.

Reily was sworn, and proved that he took the gun from defendant with some difficulty.

Lord Gort here said, he thought the act a most aggravated one, and appealed to the Magistrates to punish it to the fullest extent the law permitted them. He expressed his regret that the case should be summarily tried, and not sent to the Quarter Sessions of Gort; but he could not be in attendance.

The defendant was fined £5 with costs, or to be imprisoned for two months.

NEW ROAD FROM GORT.—The new road from Gort and Tulla to Limerick, through the chain of mountains immediately adjoining this City, was thrown open to the public on Wednesday last, and reflects the highest credit on Henry Russell, Esq. of the Board of Works, (the Engineer who laid it out) in consequence of the two great difficulties he had to overcome—first, the ascending a height of over 750 feet, by a very short base, and next, in consequence of the sum appropriated for the work, being several hundred pounds under the estimate—and which called forth all the skill of Mr. Russell, to lighten the execution upon the contractor. The inclines have been admirably preserved, and the work executed entirely to the satisfaction of Mr. Russell, by the Deputy Contractor, Mr. William Donnelly, of this city. The greatest incline is one foot in 18. The sum appropriated for the work being (as before stated) considerably under the estimate, the Board of Works declined executing it, and they left the gentleman who chiefly interested himself in the undertaking, Mr. Wilson, of Belvoir, the alternative of being himself the Contractor, or letting the grant fall to the ground. Mr. Wilson, thus forced to become Contractor, in order to insure regularity among the workmen, framed a series of resolutions, and established three funds, to which all persons, previous to being employed, were to agree to subscribe.—The funds were Penalty, Saving, and Benevolent. To witness the result of these regulations, Mr. Wilson requested the presence of several of his friends on Tuesday last, but in consequence of the wetness of the day, the attendance was but thin. The Penalty Fund amounted to little more than one pound, and had been applied to the purchase of cheap instructive books. The amount distributed in Savings' Bank books was £280 9s. 1d.; but the most interesting scene of the day was the distribution of the Benevolent Fund. Five persons who had been injured in the works attended, had their certificates examined and their cases enquired into by Mr. Wilson and the Gentlemen present, assisted by Surgeon Going; and the distribution of the Fund was as follows:—

Though Mr. Wilson encountered considerable difficulties in enforcing his regulations, it is due to the people to state, that when the above result was made known, they seemed fully impressed with the advantages that had resulted, and their astonishment at the largeness of the sum accumulated, was further increased, when it appeared that the greatest amount contributed to the Fund was by a man who having worked 155 days, had only paid *two shillings and one penny*. It is hoped the force of this example may not be lost upon the working classes of this city. The contribution was only one penny a week from each individual.

This road, besides opening a vast mountain district, and tending to increase our supply of fuel, will relieve the County Galway, and is completed, by the shortest line to Gort and Galway, and cannot fail, when it consolidates to prove the most attractive drive in the neighbourhood, the views from many points being beautiful and imposing. The entire cost was £2700. The Government made a free grant of a moiety.

Twenty Insolvent Debtors are noticed at Sligo; 14 at Mayo, 10 at Wexford, 26 at Fermanagh, 29 at Tyrone, 15 at Donegal. Lieut. Edmonds, h. p., and Lieut. Sloane, late 68th, are included in the list.

The Hon. Captain Clements, Poor Law Commissioner, is occupied with preparatory inquiries at Derry. Country gentlemen complain that the conveyance of long beams of timber from this city to the interior of the county is attended with imminent danger on the roads at night, where the carmen are often drunk, and careless of the consequences. James Cleary, of Nenagh, and Martin Keeshan, of Roscrea, for having pieces of plank beyond the statute length, which were not as the law directs, on a carriage with four wheels, or two common cars, so placed together, that the beams, or planks could be laid lengthways thereon, were fined £1 each by the Magistrates of Nenagh.

The carman gave security to bring a receipt for the deliverance of the goods on his next return. Michael Walsh, a servant of the Rev. Windham Fitzgerald, was remanded for robbery of his master; John Mulqueen, turf-porter, was fined 2s. 6d. for obstructing John Gamble, turf Inspector, in the discharge of his duty; Informations issued against Rosana Daly, for stealing ribbon from Messrs. Todd.

THE EXCISE.—Mr. Eman, supervisor, summoned Mary Walsh and Thomas Frost, for selling spirits without license; they were fined in the mitigated penalty £12 10s. each.
