HEARING this morning, that a constant reader of the *Limerick Standard*, communicated to the Editor, some information regarding me personally; I think it my duty to state, that the informer has made himself industriously and deliberately the messenger of a foul and disgraceful falsehood. He says that I addressed the people of St. Mary's on last Sunday, on the folly of proceeding to meet the Liberator (alias traitor) on his entering Limerick, and that the people resolved to carry my admonition into effect. To all this I give the most firm and unqualified denial. Were I so rash and incautious as to designate Mr. O'Connell by the vile epithet, *Traitor*, in St. Mary's, I should hardly dare it. An apology would be due to the public—an explanation now, which is this briefly:—  
A letter being placed in my hands, calling on me and the other Clergymen to harangue the people to meet Mr. O'Connell on his entry to our city. I said that I did not think the Altar of God a fit place for political discussion, and that it was the part of the people to exercise their own judgment as to the propriety or impropriety. I distinctly declared, that I gave Mr. O'Connell credit for the best intentions, and that I considered him still worthy of their confidence. I then alluded to a fact, which is this, that some persons whom I believed to be unengaged by prejudice, and earnest in their zeal for the prosperity of Ireland, attributed the *unfortunate* settlement of the Tithe Bill to Mr. O'Connell's culpable error. This is the whole truth of what I said—and nothing but the truth. Indeed I should despair of even gaining celebrity by opposing Mr. O'Connell, and I certainly am not ambitious of the notoriety of being classed among his enemies. Such is the explanation and answer to the wantonly sublimated charge.
