The Hon. C. A. Dillon, 7th Dragoon Guards, landed  
at Dungarvan from the New-York packet ship, *Garrick*,  
with special despatches for Government from Lord  
Durham, on whose staff that officer is. He brings  
confirmation of the intelligence that Lord Durham  
was to sail direct from Quebec for England, in the  
Inconstant frigate. The Officers' Quarters at the  
Chambly Barracks caught fire, and were entirely  
destroyed. Ensign Carey, 15th Regiment, perished  
in the flames.

Mr. Joseph Lancaster died at Williamsburgh, New  
York, last month. Mr. L. was the founder of the Lan-  
casterian system of education. The sudden death of  
this benevolent gentleman was caused by being run  
over in the street.

P. H. Paterson, Esq. has joined the 92d Depot in  
this garrison, on appointment.

William Morrison, School-master-sergeant, 92nd  
Depot, dropped dead in the school room of the Castle  
Barracks, on Monday morning, having been the  
moment before in apparently good health, and without  
any symptoms of illness. In the Surgeon's opinion  
he died of disease of the heart. The Mayor held the  
usual inquisition.

Saturday the Mayor held an inquest at the Castle  
Barracks Hospital, upon the body of Private William  
Russell, 36th Regt. on the recruiting service, who  
had taken ill at Bruff, on the march to Cork, in charge  
of recruits from this garrison, and died shortly after  
he was brought back for medical advice. Dr. Wilson,  
Assistant-Surgeon 92nd, examined on the inquest,  
was of opinion that death resulted from apoplexy.  
Verdict—Died by the visitation of God.
