HILARY—1839.  
DIVISION OF RATHKEALE.  
At Rathkeale, Thursday, December 7, 1838.  
DIVISION OF LIMERICK.  
At Limerick, Saturday, January 13, 1839.  
At Limerick, (including the City and Liberties,) Saturday, January 12.  
PROCESS SERVERS.  
Suitors are recommended to deliver their Processes for service twelve days before the first day of the respective Sessions, in cases where the demand does not exceed Ten Pounds Irish, and twenty days when the demand exceeds that sum. Suitors who neglect this precaution incur the risk of being dismissed with costs.  
The Process Servers are requested to mark on each Process the Barony to which it belongs, and on pain of being dismissed, must attend at Ten o'Clock in the morning at the Court House, on the day preceding the first day of the Sessions in each Town, and remain in attendance until Six o'Clock in the evening.  
When the Sessions commence on Monday, the Process Servers must attend on the previous Saturday.  
CIVIL BILLS.  
The Clerk of the Peace will not receive any Civil Bills, (whether Ejectments, Legacy Suits, or Replevins,) on any account whatever, after Nine o'Clock on the evening before the first day of the Sessions in each Town; and it is requested that all Civil Bills of every kind be delivered to the Clerk of the Peace, arranged in the Alphabetical order of the Plaintiffs' names, and in separate parcels, according to their respective Baronies.  
Civil Bills will be heard immediately after the Registry of Voters, in the following order, viz:—  
At Rathkeale.—Kenry, first; Coshma, second; Lower Connelloe, third; and Upper Connelloe, fourth.  
At Bruff.—Costlea, first; Small County, second; Coshma, third; Clanwilliam, fourth; Pubble Brien, fifth; Owneybeg, sixth; and Coonagh, seventh.  
At Limerick.—Costlea, first; Small County, second; Coshma, third; Clanwilliam, fourth; Pubble Brien, fifth; Owneybeg, sixth; Coonagh, seventh; and the City and Liberties last.  
Ejectments, Replevins, Suits for Legacies, &c. will be heard without distinction, and like ordinary Civil Bills, in the Alphabetical order of the Plaintiffs' names, in their respective Baronies.  
Ejectments cannot be made returnable after the first day of the Sessions in each Town.  
Applicants for Registry as Voters, will be heard at Ten o'Clock in the morning of the first day of the Sessions in each Town, and are requested to state in their Notices the respective Towns at which they intend to apply.  
CROWN BUSINESS.  
The Grand Jury will be sworn at Rathkeale on Wednesday, January 2d, at Twelve o'Clock precisely; at the same hour at Bruff, on Wednesday, January 9th; and at the same hour at Limerick, on Thursday, January 17th.  
The Petit Jury will be sworn at Rathkeale, on Thursday, January 3d, at Nine o'Clock in the morning; at the same hour at Bruff, on Thursday, January 10th; and at the same hour at Limerick, on Friday, January 18th.  
Applications for Spirit Licenses, and Registry of Arms, will be heard immediately after the Grand Jury has been sworn.  
Appeals from Magistrates' Orders and Convictions will be heard immediately before the swearing of the Petit Jury in each Town.  
CLERKS OF PETTY SESSIONS  
Are required to return all Informations, Examinations and Recognizances to the Clerk of the Peace, within fourteen days at least after they are taken, as they are bound to do, pursuant to the 6th and 7th William 4th, Chap. 34, Sec. 7.  
Clerks of Petty Sessions neglecting to comply with this regulation, are subject to a Penalty of Five Pounds in each case.
