**TO THE EDITOR OF THE LIMERICK CHRONICLE.**  
*Darrynane Abbey, Nov. 25, 1838.*  
 Sir—In your Paper of the 17th instant, a paragraph appeared, stating that you were informed that I was about to "abdicate" the representation of Tralee in favour of Mr. Pierce Mahony—you did me the honour of saying that you had no great reliance on a source from which the information was derived. I feel it my duty to the honestest constituency in Tralee, and the men who have three times returned me their Representative, to state, that until they find fault with my Parliamentary conduct, I shall endeavour to hold the trust they have confided to me, on the same terms on which I first accepted it. My idea is, that every representative of the people ought to be accountable to his constituents for his conduct. I am willing to submit mine to the judgment of my constituents. If they disapprove thereof, I am ready to vacate my seat; but while (as I expect will be the case) we continue to agree on public matters, I shall endeavour to do my best to deserve their good opinion. I do not often trouble the public. I am not presumptuous as to imagine my opinions of such a nature as to require publication. My constituents know me, and, thank God, they trust me. Were I to resign, I should feel it my duty, in the first instance, to call them together, state my reasons, and resign into their hands, unsullied as I received it, the trust which the free voice of the people of Tralee honoured me with, since first that voice could be heard.
