Yesterday the Mayor received the following communication from the India House, London, conveying a sample of tea, grown in the newly acquired territory of Assam, and possessing a degree of strength and flavour, fully equal, if not superior, to the tea imported from China:—

"Mr. Gordon presents his compliments to the Mayor of Limerick. By direction of Sir John Hobhouse he has the honor of sending to him a sample of tea, grown in British India, with a memorandum explanatory of the measures taken to improve the cultivation and manufacture. Mr. Gordon will be happy to receive any communication on the subject from the Mayor of Limerick, or from any persons connected with the tea trade.

Robert Hodder, Esq. the efficient Landing Surveyor and Surveyor of Warehouses in this port, is to be transferred on promotion to Newcastle-on-Tyne, and is to be succeeded here by George Miller, Esq. from the port of Belfast.

The fog was so dense upon the river last Saturday, that the Garryowen was unable to proceed on her usual trip, hence to Kilrush, and did not leave the quay.

Last evening an elderly poor woman, who went to fetch a can of water from the slip at Wilson's-quay, fell in, and was unfortunately drowned.

John M'Mahon, a western boatman, fell overboard at Honan's-quay, on Saturday night in the fog and was drowned. The body was found next morning, and the Mayor held an inquest. Verdict accidental death.

Monday evening, Constable Coe arrested Mary Berkery, who had deserted her new born infant on the foot-path at Kilmurry, where the pigs had begun to attack the foundling. The same Constable apprehended Thomas Madden, who had been on his keeping for a violent assault on a policeman in Galway, of the name of Keegan.

Monday night week, a body of men, well armed, came from the Tipperary side of the Shannon, landed near Douras, within two miles of Woodford, whence they repaired to the house of the Widow Lyons, at Clonose, which they broke open, and forcibly carried away (almost in a state of nudity) her daughter, a girl of sixteen, for the purpose of being married to a man named Toohy.

There is great mortality in the Rifles, ordered at the Tower of London.

A soldier of the 70th depot left a book in his billet at Borris-in-Ossory, which the landlord's daughter, a girl, consigned to the flames next day!

The 68th Light Infantry depot sent a party through the streets of Waterford.

The rumour of its being the intention of the militia arose out of new regulations respecting that body. It is to increase the staff, and have a sergeant and a drummer to every 30 men, to render them fit for duty, as occasion may require. It is rumoured that a third of the militia will be called out in the spring of next year, to be exercised, a third the year following, and a third in the spring of the year following.

Mr. Fish, an English officer, is accused for the abduction of Marianne Forster, a lady of 17 years, from her mother's house.

The office of Deputy Judge Advocate General of the Forces is vacant by Mr. Serjeant's motion.

The *Aliquis*, Government emigrant ship, left Cork on Saturday, for Sydney, New South Wales, and the *Marquis of Huntly* transported the 33d, 81st, and 82d, at Gibraltar.

The Cavalry and Infantry sub-divisions in London is vacant.

At St. Ives Petty Sessions, (Teague, lieutenant in the navy,) lately residing at the property of Gilbert Ansley, Esq. of St. Ives, was committed for trial, charged with the possession of a quantity of wine, a set of fire-iron, and linen therefrom.
