Margaret Keane, who had been missing from her

castle Races, was found drowned on Saturday, near
Coonagh embankment. The Mayor, from suspicions

by foul means, made a minute investigation at the
inquest into every circumstance. No marks of vio-
lence were apparent on the body, which, however,
was in a very decomposed state, and no evidence ap-
pearing to warrant the above notion, the Jury returned
a verdict of “Found drowned.”
