TO MESSRS. HAWLEY AND HANDCOCK, ASSISTANT Poor Law Commissioners.
Bruff, 17th January, 1839.
GENTLEMEN,—Had the Rate-payers of Kilmallock been satisfied with the presentation of their Memorial by their most graceful Deputation, you would not have been troubled with this letter; but since they were so proud of their composition, as to print it with all the variety of types that even the CHRONICLE could afford, surely even an humble individual in the despised town of Bruff may be permitted to look at that splendid document, and present you with a few observations on "the facts and views" by which the Memorialists endeavour to establish the pretensions in favor of Kilmallock, being the centre of the South Eastern Union of this great County.
Allow me, then, first to call your attention to the position of these Memorialists. They are the only parties in the field (though boasting of the peaceful character of their City.) Their rivals are content to leave the selection entirely to you. We have not even obtruded the merits of our case upon your attention—nor reminded you that BRUFF was already chosen as the central point of the same district, for all the purposes of legal, military, or social administration—a choice which was made when no private benefits were likely to accrue, and therefore more likely to be a wise and convenient one. We are satisfied to leave the consideration of these and all the other circumstances of the case to your judgment and impartiality. They profess to have the same confidence in your wisdom and integrity; but still they thought it prudent to prepare an ex-parte statement, and to lay it before the public. If satisfied with putting you in possession of their case, why publish it? and if really desirous of favoring you with a Lecture on the boundaries of the Union, and the relative importance of the places in it, why did they venture upon such an egregious abuse of language, as to call Ballylanders and Galbally LARGE TOWNS, and Bruce a large village! Do, Gentlemen, visit the "THREE LARGE TOWNS," and "EIGHT VILLAGES," and the "LARGE VILLAGE," and then judge of the inferences drawn from such a statement. Surely, if the relative distances be proportionate to the size of the places, you ought to establish three Unions, instead of one, for Bruff and Kilmallock districts. Let me now draw your attention from the Kilmallock "views," to their "facts." Weigh then, the following, which, if correct, would turn the scale against us:—Your Memorialists are convinced that there are NO ADVANTAGES connected with the Town of Bruff, (not a large one like Ballylanders, or Galbally, but simply a town) which KILMALLOCK does not, in an equal degree, possess." This fact belongs to the class called monstrous, as will be manifest from the following comparison founded on circumstances too notorious to be questioned.—1st. Bruff is a Quarter Sessions' town, and Kilmallock is not.—2dly. Bruff is a Market Town, and Kilmallock is not.—3dly. Bruff is a military station, and Kilmallock is not.—4thly, Bruff enjoys the constant presence of a resident Magistrate, and Chief Constable, Physicians, and an excellent Apothecary; Kilmallock does not.—5thly, Bruff possesses greater facility for procuring fuel—all the coal going to Kilmallock must pass through Bruff! Indeed, so scarce is that commodity with them, that we have a proverb here, that "a good and a-half makes a Kilmallock fire;" and as to building materials, they cannot compete with us on that score. While, 6thly, Kilmallock being on the borders of our County, being but 3 1/2 miles from the County of Cork, renders the idea of a Work-house there preposterous, and its being the centre of an Union in the County of Limerick, absurd. Either, then, these are not advantages claiming superiority for Bruff, or the additional public buildings of Barrack, Bridewell, Court-house, are to be erected to protect the new Work-house at Kilmallock—and all these benefits are, with it, to be transferred to that town, from their present possessors, at heavy cost to the County, and the present buildings here be let go to ruin; and all for the one convenience of centralization, and for the sole benefit of "the resident Proprietary, and wealthy Landholders" of Kilmallock. I admit, that some of the extreme points of the Union are more distant from Bruff, than we could desire. But fourteen miles from Limerick ought surely to mark out this Town as the next Centre in the South Eastern division of the County; and the daily improvements in our roads render the most remote places, every day, more and more accessible. I cannot here avoid recording as a singular coincidence, that this obvious solution of the difficulty was so strongly felt by the Kilmallock heroes, that at the Public Meeting here on the 21st ult. they loudly remonstrated also against the public spirit of the two most active improvers in this part of the country. But here, Gentlemen, I would respectfully submit that the memorialists have conceded this point by the following honest admission—"That your Memorialists are well aware that merely local considerations should not always be considered as reasons sufficiently strong, to decide the selection of the Centre of Union—that the other advantages which may be found, in connexion with a situation locally inconvenient, should also have due influence in the choice, and should correct the preponderance of local inconvenience." (What it is to have a blind side!) You will, and no doubt have already, wondered at this weakness of our rivals; but the fact is only to be accounted for in the same way that the pomp and circumstance, with which the Memorialists ushered in and trumpeted forth their own importance with such a slender note, are to be accounted for. Our neighbours, like Rip Van Winkle in the Sketch Book, have their minds so filled with dreamy recollections of the past, that they appear totally unconscious of their present position. They seem to forget that what was sung of Troy might be said of Kilmallock—"fruit thum"—KILMALLOCK WAS ONCE A CITY, but now alas its GLORY IS IN RUINS.
Hoping that you will be enabled in this, and in every instance, clearly to perceive and firmly to oppose every attempt made to inoculate the Irish poor laws with the Irish plague of JOBBING; and that you will teach these modern Trojans, that ingenuity activity, and type are no match for penetration, experience and integrity.
