TO THE VENERABLE ARCHDEACON HOARE. Reverend and Very Dear Sir-We cannot allow you to leave the City in which you have laboured with so much zeal and faithfulness, as a Minister of the Gospel, without expressing our feelings in reference to your departure from that sphere of duty, which you have so efficiently occupied amongst us.
