Sir Lucius O'Brien, Foreman, said that when the question of the proposed enlargement of the gaol came before them, the Grand Jury were of opinion that it should be adjourned to next Assizes, but on the recogniendation of his Lordship they would recon-

O'Gorman Mahon requested that on the event of the question being again discussed, the cess payers should be allowed to vote, as they were the persons on whom the principal part of the burden of assessment would fall.

His Lordship said he was there only to administer laws, not to make them, and he had no power whatever to entertain that question.

The Grand Jury then retired, and his Lordship fiatted the Presentments, when the Court was adjourned to Wednesday (this day.)

Sergeant Greene presides in the Record Court, where several civil bill appeals were entered.

The County Clare Grand Jury have opened a com-munication with Mr. Hawley, the Poor Law Commissioner, respecting the purchase of the Fever Hospital at Ennis, as a workhouse, and should it be so arranged is intended to erect district Fever Hospitals through out the county, in connexion with the Dispensaries one at Kilrush, for which a presentment is granted; one at Ennistymon; and one at Tulla, or Feakle. The hospital at Ennis is new, spacious, and apparently well adapted for all the purposes of a workhouse.

The time allotted for the disposal of Crown and Civil business at Ennis is so short, that an adjourment must take place, or else several cases stand over to Summer Assizes.

There are eight distringas'entered for trial at Ennis. The Record case for breach of promise of marriage, is withdrawn.

Upwards of forty cases remain untried in the Court of Exchequer, this last term.

Lord Doneraile was chairman of the meeting at

Mallow to petition in support of the Corn Laws. Sir W. Wrixon Beecher moved a resolution to that effect. Rev. Mr. Gibson, a Dissenting Minister, proposed an amendment, to abolish the duty on foreign grain, but the original resolution was carried, which so exasperated the dissentients, that they threatend to put Sir Denham Jephson Norreys out of the Borough representation, should he advocate its prayer in Parliament!

A beggarman was found dead in a dyke near Cashel,

on Monday, and £1 11s. 6d. in silver in his pockets. On Sunday last, two boys named Stephen Kenna, and John Keeffe, aged 9 and 14 years, were brought to Barrington's hospital in a state of extreme insensibility, having been found so in a field near Corbally, by some humane persons. Upon inquiry it was dissovered that the boys eat a large quantity of the roots of the wild parsnip, which is rank poison, and under he narcotic effects of which they then laboured. The omach pump was immediately applied in both cases, ed the entire of the deadly poison removed from beir stomachs, after which restoratives were put into peration, and with the happiest result. The boys adually recovered under the treatment.
