Rev. William Bourne, Rev. Philip Berry, Rev. Henry Somerville, Rev. John D. Penrose, Rev. George B. Nason, and Rev. Thomas Townsend, waited upon the Lord Bishop of KILLALOE, at Ahern Vicarage, on Tuesday last, with the following Address:

At a Meeting of the Clergy of the Diocese of Cloyne, held in the Chapter-Room of their Cathedral, January 29, 1839, and by adjournment in Cork, the Archdeacon of Cloyne in the Chair, It was unanimously agreed to present to the Hon. and Rev. Ludlow Tonson, Lord Bishop Elect of Killaloe, &c. the following Address, on his elevation to the Episcopal Bench.

REV. AND DEAR SIR,—We cannot permit you take your departure from among us, without giving utterance to our feelings, on your promotion to a great and honourable trust: and on your removal from this Diocese, in which you have been engaged as a beloved and respected Parochial Minister, since the time of your ordination.

When we consider the wants and circumstances of our Venerable Establishment, and the solemn responsibilities and arduous duties connected with the Apostolical office of a Bishop, we feel Almighty God for the selection now made, and we thank Him for so judicious and desirable an appointment—an appointment which gives universal satisfaction, not only in this Diocese where you are best known, but also in this great and influential County and which we trust, under the Divine Blessing, will be eminently conducive to the glory of our Blessed Redeemer, to the best interests of the Country, to the advancement of our holy religion, and to the welfare and stability of our Scriptural and invaluable Church.

We beg your acceptance of the small but sincere Tribute which accompanies this Address.

ANSWER.
MY DEAR AND REV. BRETHREN—I have received your kind Address upon my promotion to a higher and more honorable station in the Church of CHRIST, with feelings of the deepest gratitude; and believe me, that it is with unaffected regret I separate myself from a Christian Brotherhood, with many of whom I have so long taken sweet counsel as friends, and with all of whom, as fellow-labourers, I have lived in uninterrupted harmony and good will.

Called by the Providence of God, I go forth from peaceful and unambitious retirement, to labour amid new scenes, to discharge arduous duties, and to incur high and awful responsibilities.

It is not a path of my own choosing—it is not a plan of my own devising; the change has been by me wholly unsought, unexpected, unlooked for.

The question was not, shall I seek some higher elevation, where the sphere of usefulness may be enlarged? But shall I enter upon that path, which the hand of God, independent of my own exertions, has evidently opened up before me? Shall I shrink from that responsibility, which the voice of God has, almost audibly, imposed upon me?

If my appointment be, in your opinion desirable, if it has given general satisfaction, and will be, as you hope, eminently conducive to the glory of the Redeemer, and the welfare and stability of our Church; if, in a word, my elevation to the Episcopal Bench deserve your approval, I am bound in gratitude and truth to affirm, that to the Marquess of NORMANBY'S uninfluenced, disinterested, and conscientious decision, that approbation is solely due, and should be liberally and cheerfully conceded; the selection, I readily admit, might have been more judicious, but the motive, I confidently assert, could not have been more pure.

I will not, with a false humility, disclaim the meed of praise, which you have so generously awarded to my frequent advocacy of the different Charities in this county; and I bless God, that I have been the humble instrument in his hands of relieving, in any degree, the temporal and spiritual wants around me, and that I have dedicated, however imperfectly, the talents entrusted to my charge, to His service, and the benefit of my fellow-creatures.

Paul may plant, and Apollus water, but it is God alone which giveth the blessing and increase. Be assured, that it shall be the study of my life, through God's grace, to fulfil the solemn trust confided to me; as a vigilant watchman to walk about our Zion, and mark well her Bulwarks, and tell the Towers thereof; as a faithful Overseer, to feed Christ's flock, and preserve inviolate the Scriptural Doctrines, the Primitive Worship, and the Apostolic Discipline of our Venerable Church; and, as a Steward of his Holy Mysteries, to prepare the way of the Lord, to trim the golden Lamps, and maintain the hallowed fires, that He may find nothing neglected or in disorder, when He shall come suddenly to His Temple, even the Messenger of the Covenant, whom we delight in.

I accept with thanks your valuable present of Plate, although no memorial was requisite to keep alive in my heart the remembrance of past days, and I shall ever prize it as a memorial of your esteem and regard.

And now, my valued and never-to-be-forgotten friends, in the words of the Apostle's Benediction, grace be unto you, and peace from God the Father, and from our Lord Jesus Christ. I bid you all a grateful and affectionate farewell.
