We cannot refrain, on in occasion like the present, from adverting to your eminence as a freacher, to your Orthodox and byangelical principles, to the

your Orthodox and vangelica principles, to the benevolence of your character, to your long and practical experience as a constantly Resident Parochial Minister, and to your frequent, powerful and successful advocacy of different Charities in this County, whereby such large Contributions have been brought into the Christian Treasury, to relieve the temporal and spiritual wants of our fellow creatures. We are thankful for the opportunity now afforded to you, of a more influential and extended sphere of usefulness, although we shall ourselves experience the loss of those talents which have been entrusted to you by the Sovereign Disposer of all things. Be assured, Rev. and Dear Sir, that you have our

hest wishes for your happiness both in time and in eternity, and that you will carry with you our warmest and most respectful esteem and regard. We earnestly pray that the Spirit of God may be abundantly poured upon you, that you may do the Work of an Evangelist, and that in your new and exalted situation of an Overseer, you may seek in all things the Glory of that Divine Master, whose you are, and whom you serve, and, being found faithful unto death, may receive a Crown of life.

My Dear and Rev. Brethren-I have received your kind Address upon my promotion to a higher and more honorable station in the Church of Christ, with feelings of the deepest gratitude; and believe me, that it is with unaffected regret I separate myself from a Christian Brotherhood, with many of whom I have so long taken sweet counsel as friends, and with all of whom, as fellow-labourers, I have lived in uninterrupted harmony and good will.

Called by the Providence of God, I go forth from

peaceful and unambitious retirement, to labour amid new scenes, to discharge arduous duties, and to incur high and awful responsibilities.

It is not a path of my own choosing—it is not a plan of my own devising; the change has been by me

wholly unsought, unexpected, unsolicited.

The question was not, shall I seek some higher elevation, where the sphere of usefulness may be enlarged? But shall I enter upon that path, which the hand of Gop, independent of my own exertions, has evidently opened up before me? Shall I shrink from that responsibility, which the voice of Gop has, almost audibly, imposed upon me?

I will not, with a false humility, disclaim the meed of praise, which you have so generously awarded to my frequent advocacy of the different Charities in this county; and I bless God, that I have been the humble instrument in his hands of relieving, in any degree, the temporal and spiritual wants around me, and that I have dedicated, however imperfectly, the talents entrusted to my charge, to His service, and the benefit of my fellow-creatures.

I accept with thanks your valuable present of Plate, although no memorial was requisite to keep alive in my heart the remembrance of past days, and I shall

ever prize it as a memorial of your esteem and regard.
