They were met on this evening, the speaker said, to celebrate the centemany of this glorious, happy, and prosperous society, and he thanked God they were spared to do so. It a pleasure to him to see so many of his young friends around him, as they would be enabled in ad ranced years, to tell their children they were present the first celebration of the Centenary of Methodism. the Centenary originated with the conference in Dublin, shout two months ago-that it was then resolved to to raise a Centenary fund throughout Ireland, the

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minimum of which was to be taken at £3000 to be appropriated by the Committee-£1000 to support aged superannuated Preachers of the Society, Preachers Widows and children, whose guardians had been engaged through life in promoting the work of God—£500 to liquidate the debts due on Preaching-houses—£500 for the education of the children of Preachers; £500 to erect places of residence for the Preachers in different stations, and \$500 to erect a school-house for the children belonging the Society in Dublin. Mr. Revington having appealed to the generosity of the Limerick Society to essist by their subscriptions, the above useful pur-poses, said the deputation had not come to make speeches, but he hoped that the Primitive Wesleyans of this City would follow the example of their friends in other Cities. The Committee would give full time for the payment of subscriptions, to be taken in three instalments, of one up to June; the second up to Christmas, and the third up to June 1840—all of which were to be transmitted to the conference in Dublin, by the latter period, when the names of the donors ould be enrolled on a parchment sheet, and handed down as an example to those that would be present at the next centenary celebration of the society. He would not add more, but hoped the same religious feelings that pervaded all the meetings he had attended, would act upon the present assemblage, and that those inclined to subscribe would do so unostentatiously.—(Hear.) Mr. R. Connolly said he was every day talking to

his friends, who were then present, yet he wished to make one or two observations on the present occasion, to sustain his former opinions with regard to the principles of Methodism. Owing to the late hour that evening when the deputation arrived, he had not the opportunity of consulting them. The chief thing he wished to enforce was, that the primary object of the celebration of the centenary was purely of a religious character, and a wish to instil into the hearts of all the love of God, and the spirit of divine grace. Having adverted to the proceedings of the Dublin meeting, he forcibly impressed on the meeting the necessity for their contributing to the fund now raising, in order to uphold the character of the Primitive Wesleyan Methodist Society—a society that never would change from the original system on which it was founded, and if it did, he (Mr. Connolly) as a Protestant, would at once withdraw from it; but the same principles that prevailed in the Protestant Society-principles evidently laid down for it by God. Mr. Arthur Keane, Secretary of the deputation,

SEVERAL complaints having been made of the conduct of Master Swages in the C conduct of Master Sweeps in this City in employonduct of Master Sweeps in this City in employing Children of a tender age, and which being contrary to law, the following extracts from the 4th and 5th William 4th, Chap. 35, for the better Regulation of Chimney Sweepers and their importance, will enable a humane Public to prevent all master Sweeps offending against said Act. 2d Section enacts that, from and after the passing of this Act, no Child who shall not have attained the Agy of Ten Years, shall be bound or put Apprentice to any Person dising the Trade or Business of a Chimney Sweeper. 4th Section enacts that all Indentures of Boys, under Ten Years of enacts that all *Indentures* of *Boys*, under *Ten Years of age*, shall be absolutely void in Law to all intents and purposes. The 6th Section provides that every Person using the Trade of a Chimney Sweeper, having or retaining, or employing in his Service any Apprentice or Apprentices, who shall be under Fourteen Years of age, shall provide for each such Apprentice, so long as he shall remain under the Age of Fourteen, a leather cap to be worn by such Apprentice when out upon his duty, having a brass plate set or affixed in the front thereof, with the Name or Names of the Master or Mistress engraved thereon, and also the Name of the Apprentice, and the date of his Indenture of Apprenticeship; and every Master or Mistress neglecting to treesing; and every masser of masses in give the provide each such Apprentice in his or her Service, being under the Age of Fourteen, with such Leathern Cap and Brass Plate so affixed, and engraved as aforesaid, shall, for every such offence, forfeit any Sum not exceeding Five Pounds, nor less than Forty Shillings. The 7th Section enacts that any Chimney Sweeper who shall hire, use, retain, or employ any Child under the Age of Fourteen Years other than an Apprentice bound according to the Provisions of said Act shall, for every such Offence, forfeit any Sum not exceeding Ten Pounds, nor less than Forty Shillings.

This Act I am determined to carry into effect.
