

Lord Fortescue's eldest son, the Hon. Hugh Fortescue, heir presumptive to the Earldom, will attain his majority on the 4th of the ensuing month. Mr. Fortescue completed his education at one of the German universities. Earl Fortescue, the father of the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, though in extreme old age, having attained his 86th year, enjoys pretty good health, at his seat, Castle-hill, Devon.

Mr. Fanning, the gentleman who was lately left £200,000 by Mr. Marsh, deceased, coach-maker of Dublin, and who resides in Leeson-street, is shortly to lead to the hymeneal altar a highly respectable young lady of the county Clare.

Thomas Keane, Esq., is appointed Seneschal to the estates of Colonel Wyndham, in Clare, an office held by the late Colonel William O'Brien. This appointment has given much satisfaction to the county.

Saturday, Denis Cronceen, convicted at Waterford Assizes of conspiracy to murder the late John Keefe, Esq., was executed in front of the County Gaol. He made no public declaration, but had previously admitted his guilt.

Galway Assizes terminated on Thursday. There were eight Records for trial. The last was a writ of enquiry in the case of Colville v. Corr and wife, which excited much interest in the county, and been long delayed by the Defendant; a verdict was had for the Plaintiff in the sum of £2,000. This is the second verdict obtained by the Plaintiff in the case. Thomas H. O'Flahertie, Esq. v. Thomas B. Martin, Esq. M.P. an ejectment to recover a portion of the bog of Leenahinch, near Outerard. This was the cause of the riots in December, 1837, in consequence of which Mr. Martin was imprisoned for two months, and dismissed the commission of the peace, and the plaintiff's brother-in-law, George F. O'Flahertie, Esq. one month.

After consultation between counsel on both sides, it was agreed to refer the matter to three of the Jury. John and Denis Mannin, brothers, found guilty at Galway Assizes, of the murder of Thomas Mulcare, were to be executed on the 26th April. Judge Perrin pardoned the culprits no hope of mercy.
