As the funeral entered Denmark-street, the Chapel bell toll'd a mournful sound, and when the hearse drew up opposite the Chapel gates, a loud burst of grief escaped from the multitude. The mortal remains of him who had officiated there 26 years, were borne by his brother clergymen through the yard, and deposited in the centre aisle, opposite the principal altar. Immediately the organ poured forth a solemn dirge, accompanied by the voices of the choir. The usual ceremonies of the Roman Catholic Church were then entered upon. High Mass was sung by the Rev. Mr. Cussen, and the office for the dead repeated by the Priests in the body of the Chapel, who stood in files at each side of the coffin. After the requiem was concluded, the remains were committed to the earth, a new grave having been opened for that purpose in the principal aisle of St. Michael's, where the bodies of two other Priests are also interred. The great multitude present separated shortly afterwards.

CITY QUARTER SESSIONS—YESTERDAY.

(Concluded from fourth page.)
The Court having resumed business at 10 o'clock this morning a Jury was sworn.

Michael Manogue, Patrick Nolan, William Boland and John Shea, having been indicted for illegally taking possession of houses belonging to Lord Viscount Gort, pleaded guilty, promising to give up possession against Saturday next.

Mr. Hunt, on the part of his Lordship, said he would allow the traversers to take away the roofs they had erected, and his Worship allowed them to stand out on bail, to appear when called upon to receive sentence of the Court.

Mr. Gleeson, on the part of Michael M'Adam, convicted on Thursday of a like offence, applied to the Court to allow him to remove a roof he had erected on one of his Lordship's houses, it having cost him over £20. If so, he was willing to give up possession, but if not he was ready to receive sentence.

Mr. Hunt—M'Adam's case is different from the rest, as he was told when he was about to erect the roof, not to do so. I will not consent, on that account, to allow him to remove it, as he does not merit indulgence.

The Recorder addressed M'Adam, telling him he ought to be well advised as to the course he was about to pursue, for he had been found guilty of an offence for which the Court was bound to sentence him to long imprisonment, and that he had no more right to take possession of the house than any person walking the streets.

M'Adam having persisted in his determination to overthrow possession, unless allowed to take away the roof, he was sentenced to 12 months' imprisonment.

Patrick and Mary Fitzgerald were indicted for stealing oats from the store of Francis Spaight, Esq. The female pleaded guilty. Mr. Thos. Spellacy, clerk to Mr. Spaight, deposed to having detected the prisoners taking the oats, and Sub-Constable Cornelius having proved to the arrest of both, to whom they acknowledged their guilt, they were found guilty.

William Molony for assault on his wife, was discharged, having been bound in the sum of £20, and finding two sureties in £10 each to keep the peace for 7 years.

Jas. Moore, John Fitzgerald and Catherine Hastings, were indicted for stealing coal, hay, &c. the property of Mr. William Alexander, at Courtbrack—not guilty.

Mary Fitzgerald was found guilty of stealing a cloak the property of Anastasia Carroll. This case terminated the business of the Sessions.

ordinary recruitment is not sufficient for the emergency that requires the services of more troops, and that recourse must be promptly had either to the Militia or Veterans, and another regiment or two will have to be drawn from the reduced force in Ireland. Draughts are also under orders to proceed to Canada the 20th May, to keep up the strength of the Guards and the Coldstreams. Two Companies of Artillery proceeded this morning to Easton square, in heavy marching order, and were conveyed by the London and Birmingham Rail road to Manchester. In the afternoon a strong body of the Metropolitan Police left for the same destination. There are more troops stationed in Lancashire and Yorkshire, than in the entire of England, and all occasioned by the disaffection now prevailing among the working classes. Deal is to be garrisoned by ten officers and one hundred men, and the batteries to be put into an effective state of defence, with guns on a new principle.

"It was generally reported in the City, on yesterday, that the Great Western Steamer, in her voyage to New York, had blown up, but it was fortunate to be able to contradict it, on the authority of a vessel, who saw and spoke her in a higher latitude than that she was represented to have been lost in. "The French Ministry is formed, and with men who cannot retain their position for any time, or who have not talent for the discharge of the high functions they have assumed. The Paris Papers assert that they were got together, to enable the King to open the Chambers at the time appointed by the last Ordinance, and to appease the public excitement, which had risen to a height almost incapable of salutary restraint. This arrangement is but temporary.

"Sir Francis Burdett has raised intense commotion among the Whig-radical press from the manner in which he laid on the Ministry, for their policy at the Easter dinner by the Lord Mayor, at the Mansion House on Monday evening. The Hon. Bart. is most uncompromising in his hostility to the Government, and loses no opportunity of making his point at their expense. Lord Normanby who stood up to reply to him, was overpowered by a storm of cheers and groans, and obliged to resume his seat. The Ministry are in the worst favor with the Corporation of London.

The Marquis Clanrickarde in reference to the late meeting at Loughrea, has written to his agent Mr. Darcy, that he is not to be guided by "agitators or agitating Priests." This has given offence to the Connaught precursors.

In reference to a report of a Court of Inquiry at the Tholsel, in our last, Mr. John F. Evans assures us, that his mare, seized by the Serjeant-at-Lace, for a debt due of Mr. S. Maunsell, never was for a moment the property, or in possession of that gentleman, of which fact we have no doubt, and the Jury found accordingly to that effect. Mr. John F. Evans, it appears, had no acquaintance or dealing with Mr. S. Maunsell, a party in the suit.

Five men were yesterday sentenced by the Recorder of Cork to seven years' transportation, for robbing Mr. Hodder Roberts.

Within the last year the Conservatives have gained a majority of 127 on the registry list, and since the election of 1835, a clear majority of 770, in the City of Dublin.

In the extensive county of Galway there were only six decrees pronounced by Assistant-Barrister Freeman, reversed by the Judge.
