will not induce a cordial union of parties, to promote
what otherwise would be most desirable and proper.
When the Protestants of Ireland find they are to re-
ceive that protection and encouragement which the
law extends to all loyal subjects, none would more
cheerfully adopt an address of congratulation, and ap-
probation also, than the undivided body of the citizens
of Limerick. The Mayor, we repeat, has, on this
occasion, consulted the true interest of all parties, by
declining to hold a meeting, where any thing but
harmony could prevail.

The petitions expressing confidence in the present
Ministry, were signed at the different Roman Catho-
lic Chapels in this city and liberties, on Sunday
week—on which occasion we presume it was not con-
sidered necessary to join in the simultaneous meet-
ings, as directed by the Precursor-General, to be held
on Sunday last, with the exception, we understand, of
St. Mary's parish, at which resolutions were entered
into to the like effect.

MURDER.—An inquest was held on Sunday last before
John Cox, Esq. Coroner, at Gurthfoda, in this county, on
the body of John Hannan, a farmer. It appeared from
evidence that the deceased was returning from the fair
of Rathkeale, on Thursday last, when he was met by
a man named James Scully, who gave him a blow of
a stone on the forehead; he lingered until Saturday
morning. Doctor Johnston, of Adare, examined the
body, and found a most extensive fracture of the skull,
extending from the left and back part of the head
across the forehead, &c. terminating at the external
angle of the right eye, fracturing the parietal, temporal,
and frontal bone, in several pieces, still the man lin-
gered 36 hours after the injury. The Jury returned
a verdict of "wilful murder" against John Scully,
aided and assisted by James Scully.

Patrick M'Mahon, a farmer, residing at Park, in
this County, was found dead on the road near Lough,
on Thursday. He was returning from the fair of
Rathkeale, and is supposed to have been suddenly at-
tacked with an apoplectic fit. A woman named O'Don-
nell, returning from the Sessions of Rathkeale, on
Thursday, fell off the bridge of Shanagolden, and was
smothered. Mr. Harding held inquests on the bodies.
Verdict in the first case, 'Died by the visitation of
God.—In the second, 'Found drowned.'
