TO THE EDITOR OF THE LIMERICK CHRONICLE.

SIR,—In some late numbers of the *Nenagh Guardian* there have appeared different paragraphs in which the writers have taken unwarrantable liberties with my name; to those I would have furnished answers as they appeared, but was prevented doing so, being at the time absent in Scotland.
The most flagrant of these is a letter, having appended the signature of "Charles Langley, L.R.C.S.I." and which abounds no less with the wraith of intemperance than with a vain exhibition of easily obtained testimonials, and tending to injure my Professional reputation. However, I trust, that ere this it has been received by the Public in the light which such malevolent productions merit.

In the first place, Surgeon Langley states that he, in "cordial union, and co-operation with all the Medical Gentlemen of Nenagh, Memorialized the Government to place the Police, and also those persons grievously assaulted, under the care of properly qualified men." Now, Sir, it cannot have escaped Surgeon Langley's recollection that the "co-operation" of which he speaks, was effected through his instrumentality, having invited his brother practitioners to dinner at Brundley's Hotel for the purpose, as some of them supposed, of forming a Medical Society, but it soon became apparent that the meeting had been convened to deprive me of the Superintendence of the Constabulary, and when the "cordial union" of all could not be obtained, recourse was had to means at once humiliating and disgraceful * * * in as much as the Government Memorial, as I am informed, bears the signature of one who utterly denies having any participation in the transaction, and Doctor Dempster, whose name was surreptitiously attached, told me my return to the country, that he had written to the Constabulary Authorities, stating that the document had never received his signature or sanction. May I now ask what necessity existed that the Government should be memorialized on the subject? and have not the Government's subsequent proceedings proved that that necessity did not exist? Must not Mr. Langley have been aware that the Police, previous and at the time of the meeting, were under the superintendence of Surgeon Lindsay, whose character in the profession and whose claims as a man of talent are not much inferior to his own. Now, was this transferring either the Police or those "grievously assaulted," into the hands of one "totally unqualified and incompetent to take charge of Surgeon's cases?" but Mr. Langley, perhaps, will maintain that being a *Dublin Surgeon*, the members of every other College must be inferior to him in point of professional acquirements. Were I to consider Mr. Langley's conduct throughout this entire transaction, I must be convinced of its utter impropriety; but what will the Public say when they are told that he has adopted "that * * * course of * * * a man in the dark" to one who was at all times on terms of friendly intimacy with him, and this, too, when I was out of the Country without opportunity of retaliation.

I am accused of having "left the counter and gone to Glasgow for a few months," and returning "a properly qualified person." I acknowledge I have left the counter some six years since, during which time I have spent three Medical Sessions in Dublin, (the time prescribed for obtaining a London Surgeon's Diploma).—I had then the advantage of two years successful practice in maturing my information, and latterly I went to Glasgow, where, as every person must know who is acquainted with the curriculum of that University, I was obliged to complete an *annus medicus* previous to obtaining my degree, but if this routine of study be but "leaving the counter for a few months" Mr. Langley's own boasted long servitude at Madam Stevens's Hospital, and his practice under "John Coppin, Apothecary," cannot be deemed superior to the meereest Tyro of the profession. It is true I had not the honor of being "bound apprentice" to "that bold and first-rate operator, Surgeon Cusack," nor have I "walked the wards" of Madam Stevens's, but that presented a wider field of observation than the City of Dublin Hospital, and if the College of Surgeons in his day afforded a greater facility than it and the other Schools did in mine, I must in that case confess myself inferior, but otherwise I am satisfied to leave it to an intelligent public to decide on our respective claims for general confidence.

As the anonymous productions which are complained of did not appear until I had left the country, it cannot be supposed that they apply to me, and, as I am innocent of having ever "set down aught in malice" against any man, I must be permitted with regard to those who have acted in that ungentleman-like style respecting me, to regulate my conduct in conformity with a moral of the fabulist Aesop—"that silence and contempt are the only vengeance a man of honor can take against a fool."
I trust I have now refuted every charge which is contained in this erudite production; and after its author having delivered himself of the overflowing of his wrath, he has appended a long list of "discharges" like some rosy-faced Abigail who displays the certificates of her flattering mistresses, in the fond hope of obtaining "another place," as far as "irreproachable moral conduct," "kind manners and amiable disposition" can recommend her; but as the testimonials in question bear no date, I must conclude they were received at least ten years since by his own admission, when Mr. L. was a student, and the absurdity of them is evident, when we consider that such documents relate to *past* and not to *present* conduct, as fruitless as if a man's receiving the eucharist to-day would vouch for his remaining a Christian ten years hence. Alas! alas! of what capacious gullets must he consider the world possessed. This is swallowing a camel with a vengeance.
