The weight of the passenger carriage is to be about 1 cwt. weight, and contains room for 30 to 40 persons built in Dublin by Mr. Dawson, and made of both in Dublin. It will be used on common roads, and will be provided every 10 or 15 miles, and about two minutes will be sufficient arrangement, and but for this, Sir James Gordon's Carriage to Dublin, is provided by a very simple contrivance, and which gives a perfect covering the most acute turns, and all covered, so that no motion is perceptible of the wheels on the road. This is well to prevent fright to horses, as a man from injury, by dust or mud.
